DRAFT TWO BONUS BILLS

WASHINGTON, April 29.—The senate finance committee Republicans at a conference today directed that two separate soldier bonus bills, embodying the plans of Chairman McCumber and Senator Smoot, be drafted for consideration by the majority probably Monday. McCumber plans embrace the house provisions for adjusted service certificates with loan provisions broadened. The Smoot plan contemplates paid up 20-year endowment life insurance policies without provisions.

The form in which said proposed Charter Amendment shall appear upon the official ballot, as requested by the petitioners, shall be as follows, to-wit: "Shall the Roseburg City Charter be amended to authorize and require the City Council to purchase Block 'G,' Laurelwood Addition to Roseburg, Oregon, for a city park, and to authorize \$5000 six per cent bonds of said City to pay therefor, and to authorize a tax to pay said bonds and the interest thereon."

"Vote 'Yes' or 'No.'"
