Tuesday night the subject is "The Conversion of a Murderer," and there will be baptismal service on Tuesday evening. Oregon Growers Hold Meeting

District Manager Harry E. White of the Oregon Growers returned Friday from Salem where he attended the annual meeting of the Oregon Growers Cooperative association. He reports that there were about 200 out of a little more than 300 membership present at the annual stockholders' meeting. Among those who attended from Douglas county were the newly elected directors, R. W. Hinkley, W. J. Shupe, Remick Fate and Mr. Bond, of Glide; Messrs. Richard and Crow of Yoncalla; Loyal Emery, Umpqua; and F. B. Guthrie of the field department.

Every one of the 21 districts, covering all the way from Medford to The Dalles, was represented. A membership gain of 373 members, with a total of 3100 acres of new fruit, was reported for the year 1921-22.

The resignation of Prof. C. I. Lewis, assistant manager of the association, was received and accepted. His successor has not been chosen, though it may be announced from the director's meeting later.

Following the big stockholders' meeting that discussed the company's annual reports, the 21 directors met to start their business deliberations.

According to the reports read at the meeting, the 1920 prune pool brought a total of \$736,486.94, for an approximation of 12,000,000 pounds. About 7 per cent, of \$50,000, of this sum is still undistributed.

The 1920 pool has brought a little more money, \$745,223.25, for 7,275,000 pounds, of which full settlement has been made to the association on 7,018,799 pounds. The association has sold 24,376 cases of canned goods, and still has on hand a small quantity that is in good demand. In general, there is nothing left to embarrass the 1922 crop, whereas a year ago there was an enormous quantity of stuff from the year before that had to be sold on a precarious market. And it was cleaned up, almost to the last cart load.

The directors from each of the districts, who attended the session are as follows: Medford, W. B. Biddle, C. C. Cate, A. H. Davelhill, P. A. Sheerer; Grants Pass, P. S. Woodin; Riddle-Myrtle Creek, Remick Fate; Roseburg, R. W. Hinkley; Sutherlin-Yoncalla, W. J. Shupe; Lane county, M. H. Harlow; Linn and Benton counties, Charles Cox; Sheridan-Amity, Kenneth Miller; Salem, Frank Paret, M. P. Adams, C. H. Taylor; Dallas, Henry Voth, Sr.; Yamhill-McMinnville, George Zimmerman; Newberg, Frank Carlisle; Forest Grove, Edwin Allen; Scotts Mills-Silverton, Allen Bellinger; Clackamas county, E. C. Brown; The Dalles, G. E. Sanders.

The association has four prune driers, at Carlton, Sutherlin, Dallas, Dyer and Sheridan; receiving stations at Alpine, Corvallis, Estacada, Looking Glass, Newberg; fresh fruit packing plants at Garden Valley, Grants Pass, Medford, Myrtle Creek, Roseburg, Sheridan; a spray factory at Sutherlin; cold storage and general fresh fruit and packing plants at Medford and The Dalles; fresh and dried fruit packing plants at Dallas, Forest Grove, Salem, Sutherlin and Yamhill; and dried fruit packing plants at Riddle and Scotts Mills.

Important items of the association's business for the year are the handling of 5,935,240 pounds of Italian prunes, dried and 1,289,998 pounds of the French varieties. Apples were largest in tonnage, with 365,098 boxes of fruit and 4,423,654 pounds of culls. Loganberries followed the prunes in tonnage, with 2,420,635 pounds of fresh fruit and 64,954 pounds of dried berries. Cherries were next with 1,515,175 pounds. Especially in The Dalles district, almost every kind of vegetable and fruit was handled; in all 14 kinds of fruit, 15 kinds of vegetables and two kinds of nuts, besides the varieties within the species, were marketed by the association.
