ANSWERS "MR. FREE THINKER."

News-Review:

In his reply to my article in Saturday evening's issue of your paper, Mr. Freethinker says I misquoted and misapplied his statements of his first article. I am always sorry to misinterpret a man, and so I want to examine this situation. I did not quote his exact words, but drew my conclusions from his own statements. But let us examine his own language, and see if I had any reasons for my statements. I quote from the first article: "But once within the house of worship the subtle and masterly oratory of trained spellbinders can be depended upon to appeal to your sentiments, fears and superstitions in such a way as to insure your regular attendance and tithes thereafter." Quoting again: "It is sought to make unlawful any recreation not approved by ministers of the gospel. Which means of course that if you leave your shack on Sunday you must go to church and swell the contributions and listen to hot air for a few hours." Now people, a free-thinker signs himself, and says that the minister is a spellbinder trained for the purpose to appeal to your sentiments, fears and superstitions, and that he is trying to compel you to come to church to dispel his hot air. Now I leave you to draw your own conclusions. If it is your sentiment, fear and superstition that is being appealed to by hot air, what are we any way? Are we supposed to be thinkers. In his last article, however, he says: "No doubt he, a pastor, and with little to do except to improve his mind, has an education much superior to mine, a simple worker." In the other article, as a minister, I was a trained spellbinder dispelling hot air, and now I have a mind and education superior to him. It looks as if there was some inconsistency in the statements of my friend, Freethinker.

In reference to my impoliteness about brushing up on church history I think our friend is somewhat mistaken. I did not suggest a course of study. I challenged his statement that he made when he himself took up the matter of church history. Let me quote: "In the good old days when one religion or another was in power in every country and the people of the world were actually ruled by religion, sufficient force was always used to maintain that power and wherever force was found to be necessary there was no limit to its use." Church history, then, is a study of a man who already claims to know.

"The pastor charges me with being opposed to a rest day for theatre managers." Yes I do again. He says: "I am heartily in favor of the rest day." Is he? Listen to his own language: "Every liberty loving citizen should make his protest heard by the city council, in the way of letters and petitions." Why all this? To prevent this very rest day. I leave it to you if this man is so anxious to see this rest day observed by these men, whom he is insisting shall keep open for the pleasure of himself and others who want to go on Sunday.

Quoting again: "I have devoted considerable study to the subject of it for the most part bad, and the good it contains is generally so per religion, and it is my conviction that verities that the original authors would scarcely recognize it." Some student, believe me. Let me thus illustrate some of the badness of the people I represent. We have 17 benevolent institutions in the United States as people to care for widows, orphans, old people and babies. We have two big hospitals, half of the rooms being used for people unable to pay, who have the big surgeon and nurse to look after them whether they have a cent or not. The churches help support these institutions. This local congregation contributes heavily each year for this purpose. That is just one of the most awful things we do.

I fear I shall exceed my space, but I want to say again, that this attempt at closing the movies on Sunday has not been before our church as such. Not one church in town has had this matter before it and I believe it, nevertheless, it is true, have not the time or space to discuss which day should be observed, Sunday or Sunday, except to say that the United States government recognizes Sunday. No legal documents signed on Sunday is valid. No cop passes sentence on Sunday. Presidents of the United States have almost all been adherents to the church, and attended service to the hot air and have their superstitions appealed to. I am in favor of law, and I hope my congregation will be though I have not consulted it in the matter. May all work for the best interest of the community.

ALBANY, April 30.—An important business deal took place late yesterday afternoon when H. A. Uhlig, proprietor of the Lighthouse Electric store bought from O. W. Bishop the stock, good will and equipment of The Electric Store, Inc., at 227 West First street, thereby consolidating two of Albany's well known electrical appliance businesses. Mr. Uhlig today moved his stock and his equipment into the building formerly occupied by Mr. Bishop and will conduct his store under the name of "Uhlig's Electric Store."

Mr. Uhlig will continue to handle the various lines of electrical appliances and fixtures heretofore carried by both stores. He announced particularly that he will continue the line of Western Electric farm plants, having sold there for five years at Roseburg with good success.

Mr. Uhlig came to Albany several months ago, when he bought the Drake Electric Lighthouse store at Second and Ellsworth streets. He had recently sold his business in Roseburg which he had operated for a number of years very successfully. He has moved his family to Albany and has already entered actively into the business activities of the community. H. P. Cady, who came here from Salem to assist Mr. Uhlig will remain with him.

Mr. Bishop came to Albany a little more than a year ago from Wyoming. He had bought a house here and will probably continue to make Albany his home. He announced today that he has several business propositions which he is investigating.
