BOOSTING YOUR OWN HOME TOWN.

It is almost never that you hear any native American who will run down his home country. If he is a traveler abroad and hears the United States spoken of disparagingly, he becomes indignant, and tells these captious foreigners what he thinks of their "darned old country," as he probably says. He proceeds to laud the glories of America to the skies. His spread eagle talk has always been laughed at in Europe as provincial and narrow, but there is something fine about that sentiment of loyalty. Though he may not do his duty by his country in various ways, yet he cherishes pride in it. People who stay at home also hear disrespectful remarks addressed by aliens and tourists about America and they almost always flare up, and sometimes make it decidedly unpleasant for a scoffer. This spirit of loyalty to one's country ought to exist precisely the same in regard to one's home town, but unfortunately it does not. Plenty of so-called superior people will adopt a sneering attitude toward their local community. Their desire is apparently to show that they are familiar with all the greater centers of population, and to demonstrate that they are showing condescension in giving their home town the benefit of their presence. This disagreeable spirit is by no means confined to those who claim superior intelligence and refinement. Many who have had very few advantages and seen little of other places, will always run down their home town. The person who has true and fine sentiment, cherishes his home town dearly and sees its achievements and its institutions in the most favorable light. He knows its fine and strong men and women so well that he believes in their ability to make a good city. He is so grateful for benefits received from his home community, that he can not bear to hear its attainments disparaged. His mind dwells on the things that it has done and the triumphs it has achieved.

The Portland Chamber of Commerce has rescinded its attitude taken some months ago in regard to government control of the Diamond lake national forest district, all of which is located in Douglas county. The chamber first went on record favoring the tract of land being set apart as a government reserve, maintaining that it should remain open and without government park restrictions. Now, it seems that some strong influence has been brought to bear to force the chamber to pass a set of resolutions favoring the national park system. Why this latter move citizens of this county who are interested from unselfish motives are at a loss to discern, unless pressure has been brought by those persons who would for purely selfish ends, destroy one of the country's most valuable assets. Under forestry supervision there are few restrictions. Valuable grazing lands are left open to the stockmen of this county and other counties of the state. The opening of many natural resources in this county will be stunted if this reserve is included among the national park systems and the loss will be irreparable. The local chamber of commerce is active in the matter and resolutions were adopted last evening against Portland's attitude in the matter and the co-operation of other chambers throughout the state will be solicited in order to encourage the government to support Douglas county's claims.

Some people are always complaining of hard times, yet money is being spent for pleasures and luxuries very much as usual. The Golfer's magazine, for instance, figures that \$319,000,000 will be spent this year for expenses directly connected with golf, including club houses and courses, balls and clubs. It is also claimed that, figuring indirect expenses like traveling, motoring, etc., connected with golf playing, the total expenses related to golf will mount up to \$1,000,000,000. From one point of view such an estimate is encouraging, indicating that the country is far more prosperous than many people claim. But from another, it shows disproportionate ideas of using money. Golf is a splendid and wholesome game, but at the majority of clubs it is played with too many superfluities. If people simply went in for the healthful outdoor exercise, they could get all its benefits for a sum far below those named above.

One thing the coming primary election has accomplished is that it has caused Congressman Hawley to "loosen up" a little and get on the job to save his "goat" against the strong opposition being waged by that live-wire and aggressive opponent of Hawley's, Senator A. W. Norblad. If there is anything in the world that makes the old-line politician sit up and take notice it is that fact that there is a possibility of him losing his job. This is the predicament confronting Mr. Hawley. Mr. Norblad is making terrific inroads on the government's free seed distributor and will probably be our next congressman. A change every now and then is a mighty good thing for all concerned and it would be a wise stroke on the part of the voters to retire Mr. Hawley from his "strenuous" labors. He needs a good, long rest.

In the past a great deal of kindly spirit has prevailed between people on the road, and those who were having any kind of motor or tire trouble could quickly get help by signaling other cars. In these times when crooks are holding up cars and demanding money at the loaded end of a revolver, many motorists hesitate to stop and pick up strangers who ask for rides or assistance. It is deplorable that these dirty gunmen take advantage of the finest sentiments of courtesy, and make money by gambling on people's kindness and good nature. It can be suggested that motorists need to exercise some care as to what people they stop for but it is to be hoped that they will not cease from their friendly acts because here and there some miserable skunk makes them suffer for it.

Recall Election Called For May 19

SALEM, May 1.—Two recall elections, one of which involves Fred A. Williams, chairman of the Oregon public service commission, who was elected from the state at large, and the other directed at Fred C. Buchtel, also a member of the commission who was elected from the counties lying west of the Cascade mountains, were announced officially by the secretary of state here today.

The elections are scheduled to be held May 19 in conjunction with the primary contests. In compliance with the laws the secretary of state today sent writs of election involving Mr. Williams to all sheriffs in the state, while notices of the proposed election were sent to all county clerks.

In the case of Mr. Buchtel writs of election were sent to the sheriffs of all counties west of the Cascade mountains, while notices of the election were sent to these county clerks. The sheriffs, under the law, will notify the judges and clerks of the elections, while the county clerks will provide the ballots and other supplies.

Separate ballots will be used in each recall election in that the voters of the entire state will pass on the question of recalling Mr. Williams. In the case of Mr. Buchtel, only those qualified electors west of the Cascade mountains will be allowed to vote.

The completed ballots in each election will contain a statement not exceeding 200 words explaining the reason for demanding the recall election, also a statement not exceeding 200 words justifying the course of the officials at whom the recall is directed, and the names of the recall candidates. The former statement will be prepared by the secretary of state, while the latter statement will be prepared by the officials under fire. The names of Mr. Williams and Mr. Buchtel also will appear on the ballot. Under the law the recall candidates will have until the night of May 8th to file with the secretary of state. They will not be allowed any statement on the ballots.

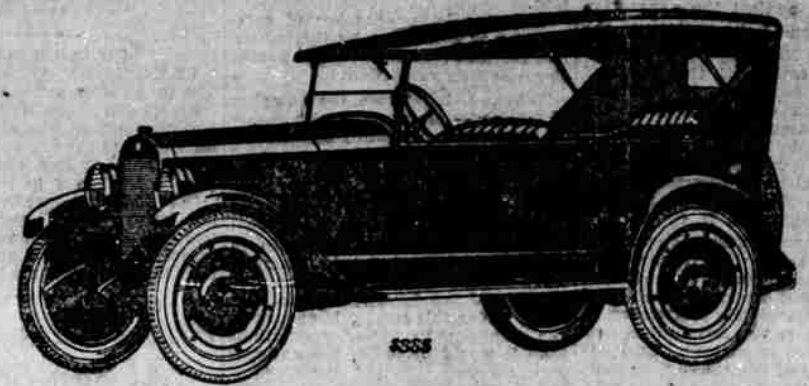
