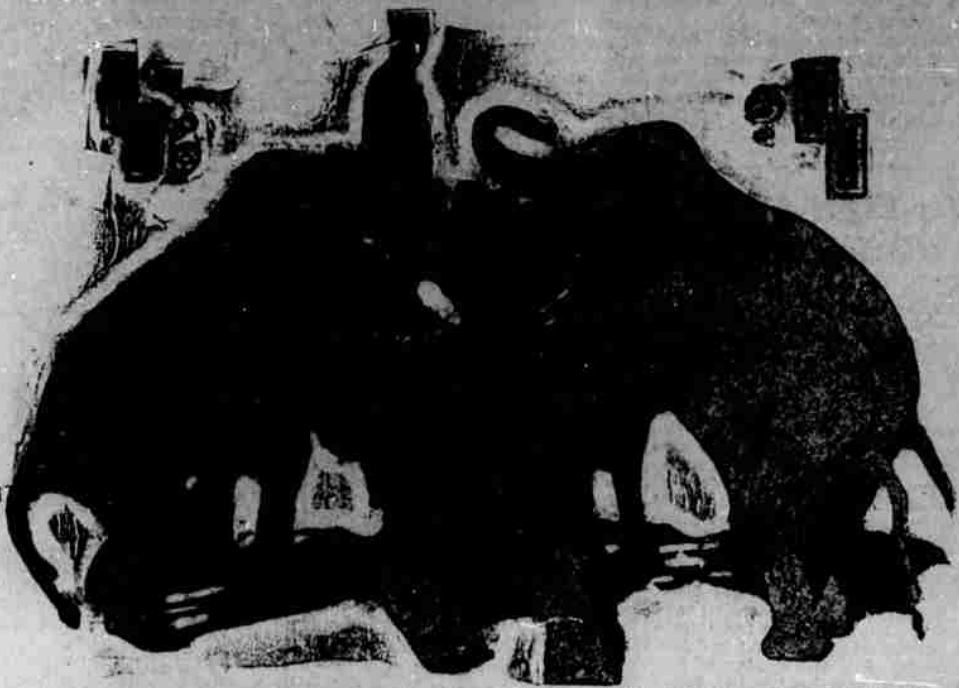

ANTI KUKLUXKLAN GROWS STRONGER IN SOUTHWEST STATES

OATH OF THE KNIGHTS OF THE VISIBLE EMPIRE

"I believe that all laws should be enforced by duly constituted authorities; in freedom of speech and press; in the sacred right of trial by jury and the privilege of every man to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience, and do hereby make application to become a member of the Knights of the Visible Empire, an organization standing for those principles."

"I solemnly declare in making this application that I profess allegiance to no secret oath-bound invisible government; that the Stars and Stripes is my flag; Americanism my duty."

TULSA, Okla., May 3.—In the days of the pioneer in the great southwest they fought prairie fires with fire.

Today, in Texas and Oklahoma, the Ku Klux Klan is face to face with an "anti" organization.

The Knights of the Visible Empire are gathering strength to oppose the white-shrouded host—the knights of the invisible realms. The southwest is splitting into two factions—klan and anti-klan.

Within the last few months the Ku Klux Klan has shown its strength. It appears to exist in every community. In the big, modern, fast-growing cities of the southwest it numbers thousands of its "invisible" empire. This has been proved by parades and demonstrations in such cities as Dallas, Fort Worth, Beaumont, Waco, Oklahoma City, Tulsa and other places.

Here, only a few weeks ago, nearly 3,000 hooded figures passed thru the streets. The parade was fifteen blocks in length. At its head masked riders bore aloft the emblem of the klan. Overhead an airplane circled, bearing a flaming cross.

All of these demonstrations, except the one at Waco, have been peaceful. And to the credit of the klan are numberless good deeds, in which the klansmen have been angels of mercy, assisting the poor and worthy with acts of charity.

Klan Causes Crime.
Against these, however, the opponents of the klansmen point to the acts of violence which have swept Oklahoma and Texas. It is not charged that the klan had any part in the flopping, "tax parties" and seizures in which citizens have been dragged from their homes and, after suffering acts of violence, have been turned loose with a warning to "pack up and leave."

But it is charged that the existence of the klan has encouraged masked riders of the night to take the law into their own hands and, cloaking their identity behind hooded masks, administer summary justice to citizens classed as "law-breakers and undesirable."

It is with these masked riders who have taken the law into their own hands, that the "Knights of the Visible Empire" are to come to grips. The new organization, incorporated in Oklahoma, believes that all laws should be enforced by constituted authority and that the sacred right of trial by jury should not be denied any man, no matter how serious his transgression under the law.

The new organization is reported to be growing fast. Whether it will reach the strength necessary to successfully oppose the klan remains to be seen. The klan has grown tremendously. And its issues have become so acute that one candidate for United States senator from Texas is campaigning on a Ku Klux platform. All efforts up to the present to curtail the klan's activities have met with failure. It continues to grow and to show its strength.

FARM NEWS

IRRIGATION OF ORCHARDS

A large number of orchards have been examined in the past 60 days and the writer feels that many of these orchards could be made to produce 50 to 100 per cent more fruit if they were given two or three irrigations during June, July and August.

Many orchards could be irrigated successfully at reasonable cost by

small pumping plants, a large number of these plants could take their water supply from rivers and other small streams adjacent to the orchards.

The cost of a small plant should not be excessive when the returns from the orchards are considered. You do not have to have a large orchard for a 50 per cent increase of crop to pay for the entire installation of the plant.

The writer has been in a number of sections in California where all the irrigation is done from deep wells, which certainly represent a maximum cost as against our abundant supply of water at shallow depths.

The county agent while not an expert irrigationist can give you some good assistance in getting your plant under way. Write the office or call and get a copy of Station Bulletin No. 160 on "The Small Irrigation Pumping Plant." The proper irrigation of your orchard will save you hundreds of dollars in fertilizers alone by allowing you to grow a crop of alfalfa, clover or vetch in your orchard. Talk this matter over with the family and then call on the county agent for more information.

APPLE SCAB SPRAY

In most apple growing sections of the county the buds will be ready for the second scab spray in a few days. This stage is known to all the growers and is known as the Pink Spray. This is an important spray application so do not omit it. Use 3½ gallons 30 standard test lime-sulphur concentrate to each 100 gallons of water. Keep your pressure up to 275 pounds and better 300 pounds. Thoroughness is very important, so do not try to rush the job.

DENTIST ELECTED MAYOR OF SEATTLE

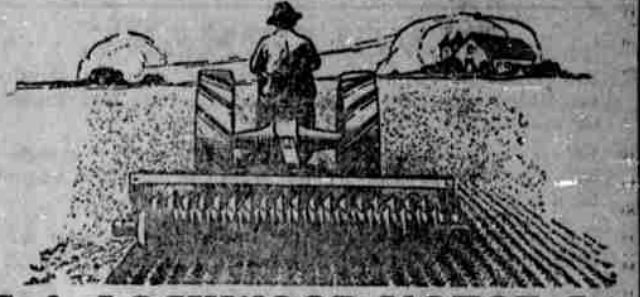
