THE AUTHORITY OF THE SCHOOLS.

There has always been a twilight zone between the authority of the schools and the homes. School authorities have frequently made regulations that pupils and parents claimed interfered with the right of family control, and fierce controversies have started from such cases. Recently some school authorities have interfered in such matters as the dress and manners of girl pupils. Students have been sent home for wearing "knickers" or short skirts or for using cosmetics or similar causes. Some parents have resented such interference and the courts have been asked to decide what authority is the final one in such questions. Many parents take a decided position on such matters. They resent any attempt of school authorities to say what their children shall do outside of the regular school session, and would even deny the right of teachers and school boards to say how the children should dress in school. While school authorities should seek to persuade their young people to dress sensibly, and work with the parents to the same end, they should be slow to interfere with harmless eccentricities. Some pupils might show such fast tendencies that it would be necessary to take decided action. Many undesirable manners can be checked better by ridicule and sarcasm than by threats and severity. School authorities may have no right to interfere with the conduct of children out of school, yet their advice can generally be followed with profit. If pupils are up late at night and with some frequency, the teacher's protest should be heeded and there are many other matters in which it is their duty to try to guide the general conduct of the children. Parents who insist too rigidly on the independence of their children from school control outside of school hours, are frequently encouraging them in undesirable ways.

Commission Will Not Oppose Recall

SALEM, May 5.—Abandonment of litigation instituted by the Law and Order league to nullify the recall election against Fred A. Williams and Fred G. Buchtel, public service commissioners, on the grounds of fraud and misrepresentation, is asked in a letter to the league today by Buchtel and concurred in by Williams. The two commissioners express it as their wish that the recall election be allowed to take its course and the people of the state given an opportunity to vote their sentiments on the principle involved therein.

I have always been a firm believer in the doctrine of Theodore Roosevelt that the people should rule and the contemplated litigation, if your interpretation is correct, would prevent this, by depriving the people of the right to exercise the ballot," declares Buchtel in his letter which is addressed to Roscoe P. Hurst, attorney for the Law and Order league.

"Having been elected public service commissioner by the people, if I am to continue in the office it will be by their sovereign will expressed at the polls and not through any court decree. Such being my feelings and views on the matter and having performed the duties of commissioner in accordance with my oath of office I willingly submit my case into their hands, feeling satisfied that justice will be rendered."

In a letter accompanying that of Buchtel, Chairman Williams writes: "I endorse the sentiment expressed by Commissioner Buchtel and believe that no one can say but that the members of the Law and Order league are inspired by most laudable motives."

"Their treatment of the situation has been dignified and reveals that their actions are inspired by a most magnanimous spirit but I prefer that the voters be given the opportunity of expressing their verdict by the ballot."

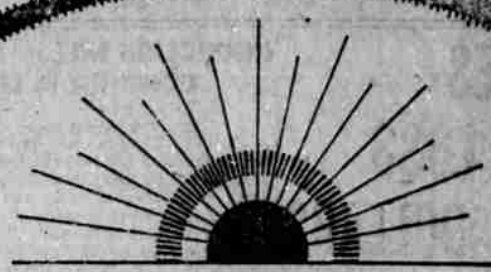
