ANSWERS LETTER

REGARDING PRUNES
Roseburg, Oregon,
May 5, 1922.

Editor News-Review:

In answer to W. F. Drager's letter in the issue of May 4th concerning the prune crop and other matters of interest, I wish to state that when this letter was called to my attention, the writer got in touch with Mr. Paulus and he states positively that the association has not offered any prunes for sale of the 1922 crop, neither have they set their opening prices, although they have booked orders for five cars, at their firm at opening prices.

Concerning the differential between 30-40's and 40-50's. This should depend entirely upon the crop and the proportion of large sizes. With a large crop and only a very small percent of 30-40's, we would be foolish not to place a good premium on these sizes. Mr. Drager wishes, apparently, to give the growers the impression that we start the differential at 30-40's and work downward, when the facts of the case are the differential is started on the smaller sizes and is worked upward. Therefore, if we place a premium on 30-40's and 40-50's, that does not mean that the grower is going to get any less for 60-70's or 70-80's.

We note that Mr. Drager was glad to take advantage of Mr. Lewis's permanent absence from this state, to ridicule him relative to the report he made to our growers concerning his recent trip throughout the east and south. Mr. Lewis stated the facts exactly as he found them, by calling on hundreds of brokers and dealers, and his report was not based upon any malice or biased information. I trust that people who read these articles and are interested in the prune industry will remember what Mr. Drager has said concerning the probabilities of never overloading the market for our Oregon prunes.

We wonder what manufacturers would proceed to make a certain product by the millions of packages without taking some thought of a market, yet this is apparently what Mr. Drager is advising the growers to do. We wonder just how much his employers, the Roseburg Brothers, have spent in advertising the Oregon prune. He states Mr. Lewis must have had in mind some pack that he was familiar with. This is true. There were at least two brands packed in Oregon last year that gave some trouble in the east, and they were neither the Mistland nor Truwest brands. This statement is not based upon opinion but upon facts. We might pause to inquire whether an industry, such as the prune industry of Oregon, is better served by direct statements of plain facts, even though these may be unpleasant or in administering sugar coated opi-

ates.

May we ask who is more interested in putting up a good pack and advertising our Oregon prunes than the growers themselves operating through their own cooperative marketing associations, and as proof of their reputation along these lines, one of the independent packers of this state tried to buy a large block of prunes from one of the large cooperative marketing associations, stating that cooperative marketing associations were in a position to put up a better pack than a private corporation.

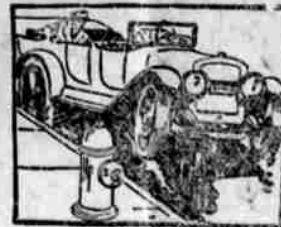
We are very glad to note that Mr. Drager is in agreement with the Oregon Growers on one point; that is inspection of the Oregon prune pack. One might almost assume that he suspected there might be some truth in Mr. Lewis's report, but of course, that could not be.

Horses Drowned in South Umpqua

A valuable team of horses was drowned and Jack Higgins, a well known farmer of the Days Creek district, narrowly escaped when they were caught in the rapid current of the South Umpqua river Thursday. Mr. Higgins was fording the river at a rather deep ford, five miles above Days Creek. A heavy corn planter was attached to the rear end of his wagon, the weight being great enough and the current of the river swift enough to drag the wagon over into the deep water at the side of the ford. Mr. Higgins managed to extricate himself from the wagon and swim to safety, but the horses were drowned. They were taken from the river five miles below the ford, just at the Days Creek bridge.
