Roseburg Woman Will Make Report

Mrs. William Bell, of Roseburg, will give a report on the federation extension work of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs at the annual meeting in Tillamook, May 30 to June 1.

Representatives from women's clubs all over the state are going to this convention. The business sessions will include reports of each of the six departments, including American citizenship, applied education, fine arts, legislation, press and publicity, and public welfare. Reports will also be given by the chairman and the scholarship loan fund board of trustees, the standing committees, and the president of each club.

Mass singing will be a feature of the opening of each session of the convention. The program for the convention is being arranged and will include a reception on Tuesday evening. Among the speakers for the convention is B. F. Irvine of the Oregon Journal, who will discuss an educational subject and Dr. E. O. Sisson, professor of philosophy at Reed college will speak on "Americanism." Other speakers and musical features will be announced later.

Mrs. W. F. Gaskins, wife of Professor W. F. Gaskins, head of the music department at the Oregon Agricultural college, has charge of the music.

Entertainment will be furnished by the people of Tillamook in the form of a trip to Lake Lyle where an afternoon session of the convention will be held followed by a luncheon and a stroll on the beach. Trips are also planned to visit some of the cheese factories near Tillamook.

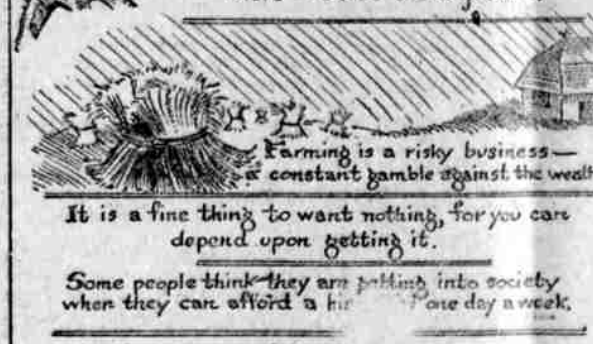

Head of Masons Bans Klansmen

SAN FRANCISCO, May 8.—A letter discountenancing admittance of the members of the Ku Klux Klan into the Masonic order was ordered sent to all members of the order in California and the Hawaiian Islands today by Dr. Samuel E. Burke of Los Angeles, grand master of the California jurisdiction of the order, who is visiting here.

In his letter Grand Master Burke said that "the practical operations of the organization do not coincide with the principles and ideals upon which our government was founded nor upon the principles and ideals of free masonry."

The letter also says its writer does not believe reports which he says have been circulated to the effect that in some localities the Ku Klux Klan is fostered and encouraged by Masons. The letter, which contains approximately 800 words, asserts that the Klan tenets are inimical to the tenets of true Americanism and Masonry and therefore have no place within the organization.
