THE FARMER'S SHARE.

The low prices on farm staples that prevailed until recently led to some agitation for restriction of production of the leading agricultural products. It is possible that the country is producing too much of some staples, and that a proportion of those who are working on some specialties would do better to turn their attention to something else. Yet if by such a movement the production of the country as a whole is reduced, instead of being merely shifted from one staple to another to meet the demand, the only result would be disaster. It shows the splendid spirit and energy of the agricultural population, that efforts to limit production as a whole have never proved popular. Some farmers who have hired a lot of help may have let some of them go and tried to do business on a lower scale of expense. But when the spring time comes, the inexhaustible energy of the American farmer always shows itself, and he is found heartily co-operating with the desire of the whole country for ample production and large crops. The low prices created by abundant crops may seem a curse to the farmers. Yet if they continue, they make conditions so much easier for people living in towns and cities that consumption of staples is much increased. Also low food prices tend to reduce the cost of producing manufactured goods, so that the things the farmer must buy will tend to cost less. The best thing the farmers can do for prosperity at this time, next to raising abundant food, is to create such improved systems of distribution that the farmers could get a larger share of the price the consumers pay. If that could be achieved, the farmers could buy more factory products, and thus give work to many now unemployed. Setting more people to work in the factories would react on the farms and create a demand for more food. Ample production and better distribution should be the watchword on the farm.

CIVIC RESPONSIBILITY.

Most American men and boys have been taught at an early age that their lives belong to their country, and in a time of national peril they must come to the rescue and defend their native land. But in the relations with one's home community there is a lack of this deep sense of responsibility. There has been little effort to cultivate it. If some good public cause needs workers, it may be almost impossible to find anybody who will give even a little time and energy to it. People will refuse to co-operate for trifling reasons. If they are asked to give some social service, they consider it sufficient reason to say that they do not want to, or are not interested. They can't take hold and help their home town because they are going on some blowout for their own pleasure. They can't give money because they are spending for some new luxury. There are some very good people, who do useful work in their own occupations, yet have no social responsibilities. They give no sign that they feel they owe anything to their home community. The effort should be made to convince people of the harm that results from this attitude. They should realize that the work of maintaining a fine city is essentially a partnership, in which every citizen has an interest and in which all must take hold and help. Those who shirk such tasks are like the slackers who refuse to hear the call of patriotism and escaped war service without a justification. If all showed such irresponsibility, their home towns would go down and fail to hold their own in the competitive race. Roseburg has gone ahead, because it has been blessed by the presence and effort of many who feel this call of home patriotism. The generation now coming on should be taught this principle of obligation, just as clearly as they are taught their duty to their country.

Colonel George A. White, republican candidate for governor, was in the city today mingling with our townspeople. Mr. White is making a very active campaign and has many loyal supporters in this section of the state. He is especially popular among the ex-service boys and they are putting much enthusiasm into his campaign.

Local aspirants for county offices are quite alert at this time and, judging from present indications, there will be a few neck-and-neck races at the primary election.
