"How Short Is Too Short?"

Flappers Ask About Skirts

(International News Service.)

YPSILANTI, Mich., May 11.—Poor, puzzled "flappers," of Michigan State Normal school, seventeen of whom were dismissed and fifteen placed on strict probation because of alleged "social indiscretions," must continue to live in a state of uncertainty. What to wear and what not to wear, how much to wear or how little, where to wear it and how, still are among the mysteries the Ypsilanti girls seek to solve. All hope that a set of formal "flapping" rules would be laid down was abandoned after the state board of education adjourned without issuing the expected dress dictum stipulating dress length and hair length in inches and whether heels should be French or otherwise. Specifications on rolltops, lipstick and rouge appeared beneath the dignity of the educators.

The state board declared that all disciplinary measures of the school must rest entirely with the president and heads of departments, just as this responsibility has rested for the past sixty-six years. The board's single direct expression on feminine follies would indicate that thenceforth discerning young women will do their smoking and other "flapper" stunts in private.

Formal reports on the seventeen students dropped from the school since October were submitted to the board by President McKinney of Michigan State Normal. The board unanimously approved the president's action and made it clear that it had no desire to review, investigate or in any way interfere with the course taken by the head of the institution. Any girl wishing to appeal her case

will be granted a hearing, however.

Silence Gives Consent. None has appealed to us or to the school authorities, however, and "silence gives consent," declared Superintendent of Schools Frank Cody of Detroit. "One case has been brought before the courts, and that case is obviously the business of the court and not the board."

In discussing the battleground of dress, as it should or should not be, or as it is or isn't, President McKinney said:

"It will be no news to the board that the Normal eliminates from time to time such students as show themselves unfitted to be teachers."

"Since the beginning of the year seventeen young women have been requested to abandon their intention of graduating from school."

"Much has been said of dress, but this has in no way at any time entered into the matter. Bobbed hair has no more to do with the matter than blue eyes. The question is whether the girl is of the type the people of Michigan want as a teacher of their children."

Four of the seventeen girls ousted, the president said, were found smoking cigarettes. He hastened to add that this was not the only charge against them.

"The schools of Michigan do not want women who smoke cigarettes," he said.

"But," wail the flappers, "how are we to know? What is the long and short of it after all? For instance, how short is too short?"

BOXING CLASSES FOR BOYS GAINING FAVOR

Plan Was Inaugurated in Australia During the War.

Schoolmasters Claim That System Develops Keener Perception in Pupils and Leads Learn to Control Their Tempers.

Why not have boxing classes for boys in the graded schools of this country?

A few of the big colleges have taken it up, and with success, but little encouragement has been given to the suggestions that the public schools and some high schools take it up and teach the boys how to box. A few years ago, or during the war, R. L. "Snow" Baker, manager of the big stadium in Sydney, where all the big boxing matches are held, took it upon himself to establish boxing classes for all schools as a preliminary to training the young men for the army. It was very successful and many of the schools took it up as a regular course for the boys. The department of education in Sydney, Australia, made the following report regarding the progress made with boxing in the schools:

"The scheme for the teaching of boxing in schools introduced by the minister for education, Mr. Nuteh, under the supervision of Hector Melville, has met with tremendous success during the short period it has been on trial. Reports to and from the various headmasters of schools where the scheme has been introduced speak very highly of Mr. Melville's system, and are of a most congratulatory nature."

"The headmasters claim that the system has developed in the pupils a keener perception, a greater energy, and, generally speaking, a decided improvement, both mentally and physically. The reports also claim that the boys learn to control their tempers and show a good, sporty feeling towards their schoolfellows. Opinions are held by parents and others for and against boxing."

"It was recognized by the minister that boxing is a clean, healthful sport when properly handled. Schoolmasters who, at the inception of the scheme, held the opinion that boxing was not desirable, have now altered their views entirely, and have nothing but the highest terms of praise for it. This speaks for itself when one considers the short period during which the system has been on trial. Mr. Melville intends submitting this new scheme for organization throughout the state for the current year for ministerial approval."

ROSARIES FROM HOLY LAND

Important Bethlehem industry is the Manufacture of Beads From Material America Sends.

Ten to twenty tons of the pearl-shell waste of American button factories—broken pieces and butt-ends of shells—are shipped monthly to the Holy Land, where, in the village where Christ was born, the material is converted into beads and ornamental objects. For many centuries the manufacture of such products has been the only important industry of Bethlehem. They find a market largely in the United States. In 1920 there was shipped from Bethlehem to this country at least \$50,000 worth of rosaries, made of mother-of-pearl beads, with silver chains and strung on wire of the same metal, or "white metal" for a substitute. For making larger carved or other ornamental objects Bethlehem obtains supplies of pearl-oyster shells from the Persian gulf, from India and from Australia. The chains of silver and white metal are imported from France. Hand labor is employed exclusively in the industry, and, inasmuch as it is very cheap, the idea of using machinery is regarded with disfavor.
