MILLAGE REPEAL MEASURE PUT IN

Tax Reduction Clubs Sponsor
Initiative Bill to Be On
Ballot.

REMAINING LEVY AMPLE

Reductionists Father Amendment
Providing Two-thirds Vote for
Issue of Bonds for the
Creation of Debt.

SALEM, Ore., May 10.—An initiative measure sponsored by the Tax Reduction clubs, proposing to repeal

the one and two-tenths millage tax for the support of the higher educational institutions was submitted to the secretary of state today for its ballot title.

In explaining the measure members of the clubs said that following the equalization of assessments the remaining millage levy will provide sufficient money to care for the educational institutions.

Tax reductionists declared that under the proposed equalization plan several millions of dollars worth of property which now escapes taxation will be made to pay its just share of the public burdens.

Another offering of the reductionists was a proposed constitutional amendment which provides there shall be a two-thirds affirmative vote at the general elections for the approval of any measures authorizing the issuance of bonds or creation of public debt, and prohibiting the submission of such measures at special elections.

J. C. Cooper Signs Offerings.
The Tax Reduction club offerings were signed by J. C. Cooper, of Minnville, president of the organization.

Sam A. Kozen, secretary of state, tonight referred the measures and amendment to the attorney general for ballot title.

Classification of lands and improvements for the purposes of assessment and taxation is the outstanding feature of an initiative measure submitted today for ballot title by the Oregon Tax Equalization association, and will go before the voters at the general election in November.

Assessment Plan Set Forth.

The proposed measure provides that manufacturing and merchandising establishments shall be assessed at their full cash value, lands at one-half their cash value, improvements on farming lands and all dwellings at one-half their cash value, and all other improvements, buildings and structures at their full cash value.
