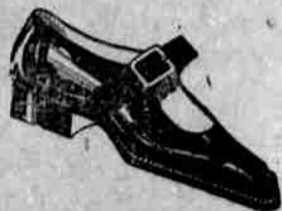

ROSE SCHOOL WINS SECTIONAL MEET

Interesting Athletic Contests Held at Rose Field Saturday Afternoon.

SEVERAL RECORDS MADE

Children Vie in Athletic Events and Make Exceptionally Good Records —Are Preparing for County Meet to be Held May 20.

Rose school won the sectional track and field meet Saturday at the Rose school grounds by a large score: Rose 184, Benson 86, Fullerton 42, Green 27, and District No. 33, 3 1/2 points.

The Rose athletes far surpassed those from other districts, winning first and second places in many events and not falling to win in any.

In the high jump Lyle McCulloch and Leslie Hagerty, both Rose school, tied for first place, making the exceptionally good record of 4 feet 11 inches. Mary Malcolm of Benson won the class C girls' flag race in the exceptional time of 17 seconds.

Mona Porter and Robert Schrader tied for high point honors, each taking three first places. David Dunham, Leslie Hagerty, Lyle McCulloch, Ruby Minter, Peter Sommerhalder, Malcolm and Queen Nichols each succeeded in winning two first places.

A large crowd watched the contestants toiling under the sun of the prettiest day of the week for three and one-half hours. The most of these athletes will be seen again in action next Saturday, May 20, at the Douglas county track and field meet, and an even better performance can be expected from them, as they will have the additional time for training. To Start Apartment House This Week

All bids on the construction of the Kohlhaugen apartment house have been rejected by Mr. Kohlhaugen, who announced this morning that he will build the structure himself on sub contracts. He is now getting in the sub bids and will probably allow the contracts on the various items of the construction about Wednesday. The contract on the excavation will probably be let tomorrow and actual work will be started at once.

R. W. Jones, the designer of the building has been employed as superintendent and will remain in Roseburg until the work is completed. The plans were drawn by Architect Lee A. Thomas of Portland.

Mr. Kohlhaugen states that the bids were not satisfactory and that he has decided to take charge of the construction himself. Additions to the original plans have brought the estimated cost of the structure up to about \$125,000. The work will be started without delay and the building will be made ready for occupancy as quickly as possible. The apartments have been in ready demand and practically all have been spoken for.

DANGER IN BORING FOR OIL

Fluid Frequently Comes With Force and Suddenness That Workers Find Hard to Control.

Fuel oil, as a means of propulsion, has been gradually coming into favor for a number of years. The war increased its use in many ways, and the coal strike gave a fillip that may only be overcome when the comparative cost between coal and fuel oil gives the former the advantage. Boring for oil is often accomplished with danger to the men from the pent-up force which is released. The first indication that oil has been reached is a rush of gas and then comes oil, sometimes with such terrific force that it has been known to carry tools, gear and loose stones and earth to a great height. Large quantities of oil are often lost before a valve can be placed over the hole and a check put upon the gusher. So great is the pressure—it varies from 200 pounds to 1,000 pounds—that oil may spout hundreds of feet into the air. In Mexico, a few years ago, a column of oil reached 600 measured feet. It is unsuitable for use when first got out of the ground, owing to the mud it contains, but when this has settled to the bottom of the settling tank it is refined. First petrol and benzine are extracted by distillation before it is sent to the storage tanks to be used as crude oil. So far the method which finds most favor for burning oil in furnaces is known as the low pressure furnace, and is forced through pipes to the burner under the boiler in the form of a fine spray.
