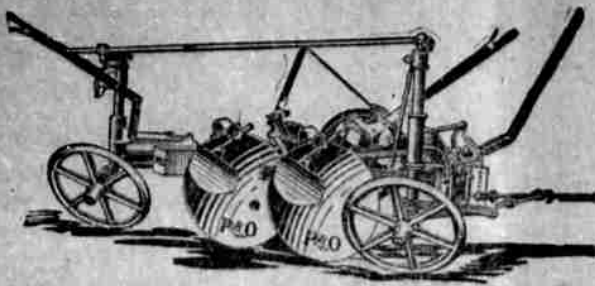

## Umpqua Harbor Hearing Slated

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Representative Hawley has arranged for Commissioner Spry and Assistant Commissioner Proudfit of the general land office to appear before the committee on rivers and harbors at the request of Chairman Dempsey for the purpose of stating to the committee the importance to the government of the improvement of the Umpqua river.

"This improvement," Mr. Hawley said, "will afford a market for the lumber and increase its stumpage value, with the result that while the government is asked to put \$276,500 in the improvement it will receive several times the amount in the increased value of its lumber in a comparatively short distance from the mills in the river. The timber is chiefly in the former Oregon & California railroad lands."

"Chief Forester, Greely will designate a representative to appear in behalf of the forest service. The government owns about 31,000,000,000 feet of timber in the Umpqua watershed and the fact that the tributary streams in the watershed as well as the Umpqua river itself can all be used for driving logs makes this waterway an excellent location for manufacturing lumber."
