LOYALTY TO HOME INTERESTS.

Affection for one's home town ought not to be merely a warm and generous sentiment, and a willingness to co-operate in public improvement, but there should be a practical movement of loyalty and partnership binding together all the people of a community. If the people of a city stand together in a business way, keep their money at home, depend upon each other for services and merchandise, that city is going ahead a great deal faster than if this condition does not prevail. When you send money away from home, you drain away the life blood of the commercial community. Yet set that money to circulating in some more or less distant city, building up prosperity there. Meanwhile your own associates and business neighbors have suffered from the lack of your co-operation. Much credit is due to the business men of this community. They have supported with their influence and taxes the public improvements that give us the advantages of living. They pay a good share of the costs of the schools, streets, and other facilities. If they prosper all these advantages keep improving. But if these business men are left to fight their own battle by the set of their townspeople, then they can't do much for this city. A spirit of pessimism will creep into our business relations. A city where the people feel a strong sentiment of loyalty to each other, where they take pride in their home institutions and enterprises, where they patronize the home dealer every time rather than seek fancied advantage elsewhere, has the right spirit of local patriotism. It will be one which is constantly gaining in population, advantages and culture.

A number of leading women's organizations are initiating movements to make war a crime, so that any government making war would be subject to international discipline, the same as a man who breaks the civil law. Such a proposition arouses, of course, the old controversies centering around the league of nations, concerning which people hold radically different views. But the whole world abhors war as never before, and wants to stop it. The time may come when an international army will be created which shall line up the whole world against any power that undertakes to interfere with its neighbors. But a great obstacle exists to such a movement at this time, that the nations are so suspicious and jealous of each other. The great problem of today is how to break down these barriers of antagonism that keep the nations from acting together. The only solution is just plain old fashioned justice. As long as the various countries retain the old grab spirit that has disgraced international relations so long, co-operative action to outlaw war becomes difficult on any thorough going scale.

A woman who observed a large company of college girls the other day was moved to remark how few there were whose faces showed signs of "make-up." Their fresh and natural faces were very pleasing after observing the highly artificial appearance of many young women of the period. Many young women seem to think they must load their faces with artificial beauty in order to create a favorable impression. But here was a group of favored girls who will be leaders in their social circles, most of whom seemed satisfied with the faces nature gave them. Perhaps they had learned that attractive color can be gained quite as well from out door life and athletics as from any paint pot.

Here's hoping Congressman Hawley gets a good, sound drubbing at tomorrow's election. He should be retired and given an opportunity to regain his strength after sixteen years of "strenuous" application in the halls of congress. A vote for Senator Norblad, his livewire opponent, will do the job up in fine style.

Congressman Hawley is so slow to act on the postmastership of Roseburg that the job is still hanging in the balance. Wonder if he thinks this action is going to make votes for him?

It's too late to swing any support to a "dark horse" candidate. The mould has been cast for the next governor of Oregon—from a primary election standpoint.

Who's who in the governorship race will be known very shortly after the polls close tomorrow night.

CHAUTAUQUA DATES
JUNE 25 TO JULY 1

Opie Reed Internationally
Known Will Head the
Lecture Program.

FINE MUSIC COMING

Famous Play "Cappy Ricks" and
Company of Magicians to Be Chief
Features of the Week of
Entertainment.

The chautauqua season of 1922 is an important one in the history of the Ellison-White Lyceum and Chautauqua association as it is the tenth anniversary of the establishing of chautauqua business in the west. To build a program which would fittingly celebrate this happy event was evidently in the mind of the Ellison-White management when the program for the coming season was arranged. The dates for the Roseburg chautauqua have been definitely set for June 25 to July 1.

Heading the lecture list is Opie Reed, a prominent platformist whom the Ellison-White people have been trying for the past five years to secure for a tour of their western chautauquas. Opie Reed is like no one else in the world. Perhaps you have enjoyed his books, been stirred by his plays, or spent happy hours in the reading of his clever character sketches, but unless you have sat within the sound of his voice and heard from his own lips the quaint tales that originate in his brain, you do not fully appreciate the splendid genius of the man.

The sixth night of chautauqua will be one of the most important of the entire series. On that night comes Dr. Elmer Lynn Williams, "fighting parson" of Chicago, in his famous lecture, "The Big Game." Boodlers, gamblers and dive keepers on Chicago's famous "north side" know and hate Dr. Elmer Lynn Williams. They hate him because he is one of the bitterest foes graft and corruption ever had. In his fight in clearing up vice and crime in Chicago's loop district, he was given the name of "fighting parson." Dr. Williams was formerly pastor of one of the largest churches in Chicago and comes to chautauqua at the height of his oratorical power with a message that is vigorous and vital.

Other prominent names found in the list of lecturers are: Norman Allan Imlie, who is described as a "perfect tornado of eloquence," using as his lecture subject, "Working Together for Millions," a masterly exposition of the Anglo-Saxon problems of the age; Edna Eugenia Lowe, telling in an interesting way of some "Danger Signals on the Road to Health," and J. C. Herberman, a brilliant, rapid-fire lecturer will discuss "Life's Balance Sheet."

Two entertainment features of the week will be the well known play, "Cappy Ricks," a dramatization of the "Cappy Ricks" stories which ran in the Saturday Evening Post and were read by millions; and an evening of magic with the Paul Fleming company, master magicians.

That the musical end of the program has not been slighted is evident with such musical organizations as the following on the list: Stearns-Hellekson Trio; Patton Brothers Trio; The Oceanic Quintet; Watteau Duo; Stone-Platt company and the Gilvan Opera company.

Tusko Runs Wild

SEDRO-WOOLLEY, Wash., May 16.—After being at large all night, Tusko, said to be the largest elephant in the world, was captured about three miles west of here at about 10 o'clock this morning. The elephant escaped from a circus which showed here last night and caused considerable property damage.

SEDRO-WOOLLEY, Wash., May 16.—Tusko, an elephant said to be 3000 pounds heavier than the world famous Jumbo, went on what his trainer called a rampage here at about 8 o'clock last night, upset two automobiles standing by the circus tent, stalked angrily down the main street, where he broke up a street dance, then strode to the outskirts of the city to a district known as the "Garden of Eden," where he wreaked vengeance on fences and a farmer's young orchard. This morning the elephant was still at large, two or three miles from the city, with his trainer and others trying to calm him.

The automobiles, which were upset as Tusko picked up his tent and walked, were unoccupied.

Minimum Broccoli
Shipment Reduced

Through negotiations of the public service commission with carrier-shipper representatives a reduction in the carload minimum weight on broccoli has been secured in connection with the rates of the Southern Pacific company on shipments of this commodity.

Heretofore 24,000 pounds was the least weight at which shipments might secure the lesser carload rate, and while investigation developed that in some instances the commodity loaded to or in excess of 24,000 pounds per car, it became known that a 20,000 pound minimum would be of material advantage and encouragement to the industry, dealers generally. The establishment of the new reduction, while originating with broccoli shippers in and around Roseburg, is of equal interest to all growers and shippers of this commodity throughout the valley.

Tarif publications will be made effective at an early date so as to be available for any and all future shipments.

HIGH TEMPERATURE RECORDED

Tuesday and Wednesday broke all May temperature records since the year 1912, according to Weather Observer Wm. Bell. The maximum temperature reached on those two days was 90 degrees, the highest temperature recorded during the month of May for 10 years.

In 1912 the thermometer reached 94 degrees but has never gone to 90 since that time during the month of May.

PIONEER OF 1822 PASSES AT
HIS HOME IN SCOTTS VALLEY

John Letsom, an honored early pioneer and one of our highly esteemed citizens of this community, passed away at his home on Lone Cedar farm in Scotts valley, Saturday, April 29, 1922, at 5 o'clock p. m., aged 94 years and 47 days.

His birth occurred in Shropshire, England, March 13, 1828. His parents were Thomas and Margaret (Davis) Letsom, both of whom were natives of Wales. Mr. Letsom commenced his travels in England in 1845, crossing the Atlantic ocean, then crossing the plains to California in the gold rush of 1849. He reached the valley of Yoncalla in the spring of 1852, locating about six miles northeast of Yoncalla, where he took up a donation claim of 160 acres on Maple creek on what is now known as the R. Roy Booth farm. In August, 1856, he was married to Mrs. Sarah Lewis, a widow, with three children, towards whom he did a father's part. In 1861 he moved to Yoncalla, where he built a blacksmith shop and established a home. He was appointed postmaster and served two terms as assessor in old Umpqua county. In 1869 he moved to the farm in Scotts valley, where he resided until his death.

Unto Mr. and Mrs. Letsom were born four sons and five daughters. Those that survive are Thomas Letsom, Evan W. Letsom and Mrs. Mary Letsom Goodell of Yoncalla; Mrs. Martha Letsom Harris of Chelan, Wash.; Mrs. Talitha Letsom Hedrick of Drain; David Lewis, a stepson, of Clover, Idaho; also 22 grandchildren and 35 great-grandchildren. Mrs. Letsom, the wife and mother, was called to her final rest January 19, 1898.

Mr. Letsom had been in failing

health for a number of years but was lovingly cared for by his children and grandchildren. He was the memory of the old man Rev. J. L. Benton spoke of in the life of the deceased. Relatives from a distance attended the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. C. Hodges and children, Myrtle C. Mrs. Eva Aubrey, Mr. and Mrs. J. Miller and children, Mrs. J. Schneider, of Cottage Grove; Letsom, of Drain.
