J. Newhouse, general manager of Washington Growers Packing association, accepted the position of assistant general manager of Oregon Growers Cooperative association.

Newhouse, graduating from Oregon State College, later entered the work of county agent of the county, the second largest district in the northwest. He became known as an efficient adviser and a competent organizer. It was through his efforts the Washington Growers Packing association was organized, and which he left his county agent to accept the position as the assistant general manager of the association has had.

Odd Fellows Will Sleep on Cots

EUGENE, May 11.—"Many delegates to the state convention of the I. O. O. F. lodge, which will be here next week, beginning Tuesday, will be forced to sleep on cots," says J. W. Zimmerman, who is taking a prominent part in making local arrangements for the convales. Over 800 rooms have been secured by the room committee, but a great many more are needed to accommodate the visitors, who are expected to number about 5000. A number who live in nearby towns are expected to return home at night, which will relieve the situation somewhat.

The Portland Odd Fellows 50-piece band has made arrangements with railroad officials to park their Pullmans here during the convention, so they can be used for sleeping quarters. Several hundred cots are to be placed in the Hampton building at Sixth and Willamette streets for the use of those who cannot secure rooms. Additional cots may be placed in the armory.

Registration headquarters will be established in the Hampton building, where an information booth is to be maintained. The official headquarters of the Patriarchs Militant will be at the Hoffman hotel and of the Rebekahs at the women's parlors of the Elks club.

The big event of the convention so far as the general public is concerned, will be the Wednesday afternoon parade and drill. In addition to officers and members of the I. O. O. F. lodge from all parts of the state, there will be in the parade the big Portland band, and the Albany and Eugene Odd Fellows' bands. The parade will be followed by a competitive drill at Hayward field. In the evening the Muscovites will hold another parade and Thursday evening the Orientals.

The reception and dance for the visitors will occur at the Woman's building of the University of Oregon Thursday evening and is expected to be attended by one of the largest crowds ever assembled at a similar function in the history of the city.

E. K. Wheeler is chairman of the general committee on arrangements and announces that everything will be in readiness to receive the visitors, the first of whom are expected to arrive Saturday.
