

Ohio "Reform Mayor", Now Seeking Governorship, Says He Will Run for President

CLEVELAND, May, 19.—Can George L. Oles, reform mayor of Fairport, Ohio, who last fall defeated the candidates of both democratic and republican parties in a three-cornered race for mayor, during which he mixed political philosophy and sagacity with his grocery advertising, repeat on a statewide scale in November?

This question is one that is concerning the "old guard" of both political machines, and while for republicans these leaders of political thought discount the effect of Oles' announcement that he will be an independent candidate for governor, privately they admit that they fear the effect of his entry upon party lines. Oles himself is supremely confident.

"The brief years as governor of the last state the Lord ever made," he declares, "and Warren G. Harding can turn the keys of the White House over to me. Sure, I'm going to run for president, and I'll be on the independent ticket, too. Roosevelt ran that way, and lost. I'll have the politicians some new kinks about this independent game."

"My insignia will be a streak of lightning," he continued, turning to discussion of his independent candidacy. "One political party has chosen a rooster as its political emblem; the other asks votes under the eagle. I'm strong for this anti-stuff, but I'm going to break away from natural history."

"I'm going through this state so fast in my campaign for governor that the politicians will be unable to catch me with anything less speedy than lightning. I don't know or care who my opponent will be this fall. They all look alike to me. My advice to them is not to spend the money in the family sock in the primaries. As far as they are concerned, it will be a total loss."

Mayor Oles, whose slogan in Youngstown last fall, "Let George do it," won him thousands of votes, has amplified it somewhat for state campaign purposes and Mrs. George is going to do part of it.

"Certainly, Mrs. Oles will be with me every step of the way in my campaign," he declared. "I'm going to make a speaker of her. While I

make my special appeal to the women voters my wife will talk to the men."

"Most of my speeches will be made from the back platform of a Pullman. However, my visits to the rural sections will be by airplane. I will have no set itinerary there, but will just fly around and when I see a group of men making hay, cutting wheat or plowing corn I will swoop down, give them my message and be on my way."

Here are some of the promises made by Mayor Oles to the voters in announcing his candidacy:

Tenets of Platform.

Take the electric chair out of the penitentiary and hang all murderers outside the penitentiary where everyone can see them and where their fate will serve as a deterrent to the crooks who have not left the country.

Make prohibition a fact in Ohio. Give personal attention to state penal and correctional institutions. Clean up the taxation muddle.

Build more highways. Drive 100,000 "crooks and profiteers" from the state of Ohio. Financial relief for cities.

There is a good job still open in connection with the mayor's political aspirations—that of campaign manager.

"For that job," says Oles, "I want the fastest, smartest, best and most honest man in the state. If any man thinks he possesses these qualities let him drop around and see me. I also want a few good spellbinders. These must be top-notchers, have leather lungs, be quick on the trigger and regular Solomon. All such I can use."

People throughout the state today are laughing, as the people of Youngstown did last fall, when Oles barely eligible as a candidate for office because of his brief residence in the city, announced his candidacy for mayor in a page advertisement, most of which was devoted to exploiting the wares offered for sale in his grocery store.

Not Taken Seriously. The politicians didn't take him seriously, but the voters did and he won. Whether he can repeat on a statewide scale is a matter that can only be answered when the votes are counted in November.

ROSEBURG TO HAVE FINE GOLF COURSE

Expert Says That Roseburg Has Finest Natural Course in the Northwest.

HAZARDS ARE PERFECT

City Clubs Have Spent Many Thousands Trying to Duplicate Course Which Nature Has Provided for the Roseburg Club.

Roseburg has the most wonderful natural acreage for a golf course that is to be found in the northwest, according to W. H. Nash, of the A. G. Spaulding and company, who was here today for the purpose of assisting the local golf club recently organized in laying out their course. Mr. Nash visited the Curry estate near Brown's bridge, where the club has located its grounds, and found it an ideal place for a course and he at once measured off and laid out one of the finest nine hole courses to be found in the state.

"Thousands of dollars have been spent by other communities in clearing their courses and creating fairways, greens and hazards," Mr. Nash says, "but here everything is already made, and all that is necessary is to run the mower over the course to create the fairways, construct the greens and the course is ready."

"It is ideally situated. Located adjoining a fine road, with a 600 yard frontage on the North Umpqua river, there are places for tennis courts, an opportunity for boating, bathing and fishing, and an ideal site for a clubhouse, with a fine oak grove nearby to furnish plenty of shade."

Mr. Nash designed a course which has a par of 36, that is, that it is possible to go around the course in 36 strokes, although very few players will ever be able to make the course in that number. He has provided plenty of trouble and there is a wide variety of shots provided, and the golfer will need every club in his bag to get around.

The first hole is 600 yards. It is guarded on the right by oak trees for a hook shot, and those who slice will be penalized by being in a ravine. This hole should be a good test for golfers as it will take the average player four long shots to reach the green.

The second hole will be a 365 yard and the drive will have to carry over a natural hazard in the way of a ravine. This hole is a blind hole and the second shot will have to be placed to the green without being able to see it.

The third hole is a midiron shot of 180 yards with the green well guarded with oak trees which afford trouble for those who have a tendency to pitch over.

The fourth hole is a short mashie shot and it will be necessary to keep the ball straight or the player will be in trouble.

The fifth hole is 167 yards with trouble for the man who hooks. There will be two long shots to the green and for the average player 3.

The sixth hole is 325 yards with a long carry on the drive, the second shot is down hill with a very good chance of overshooting and being out of bounds.

The seventh is a beautiful hole of 400 yards, up through a semi-dogleg then through a ravine. The green is well banked on either side and in the back by a natural haard.

The eighth hole is 325 yards down a ravine and over a hill, and affords a good test in holding the shot to the green.

The ninth hole is an excellent dog leg of 450 yards. The shot from the tee will have to carry a ravine 100 yards away and the second shot will be over a ravine also.

The course has a total yardage of 3,623 yards and provides natural hazards, which clubs in cities have spent thousands upon thousands of dollars to duplicate.

Mr. Nash states that when the Roseburg course is developed it will become one of the best known in the state as it has every natural advantage and is ideal in every respect.

The local club is well pleased and will start work at once in preparing the course. The expense will be much less than had been anticipated as the course needs very little work to be in ideal shape.

advance his candidacy. At the same time that he announced his intention to seek the governorship, he issued a statewide appeal for a campaign fund of \$100,000, limiting each contribution to a sum not greater than \$5. He says that already the response to this appeal has been surprising.

Ohio has long had the habit of independent voting. In 1899 Mayor "Golden Rule" Jones, of Toledo, running as an independent, polled more than 100,000 votes and carried Toledo and Cleveland.

Oles is endeavoring to get Dr. Amy Kaukonen, girl mayor of Fairport, to run for Lieutenant-Governor. He has received appeals, he asserts, from all parts of the state urging him to place the name of "Fairport's fighting girl mayor" on the ticket.

Miss Kaukonen, however, has not yet decided whether or not she will become a candidate. From her home she has announced that she will "think it over."

Advice to Lovelorn and Others

Dear Mrs. Ellsbury: Would it be too much trouble for you to tell me what the lightest metal in the world is? We are supposed to look this up for school, as we had an argument over it, but I haven't been able to find it. Thank you, if you can help me.

Ans. The lightest known metal that remains comparatively unaltered under ordinary atmospheric conditions is magnesium. It is only about two-thirds as heavy as aluminum.

Dear Mrs. Ellsbury: I wonder if there is any way you could tell me how some girls achieve that sleek, well groomed look they have every time you see them. Some of them work in offices, some are just housewives, and some are school girls, but I can tell them instantly when I see them. I am sure I don't look that way. I have as many clothes as they do, and I am clean, but I know I haven't that look. Anyway it does not seem to be a matter of clothes. One woman I know does not change the one suit she has, but she always looks better than I do. Can you tell me?

WANT TO LOOK WELL.
Ans. It is not easy, and it is not really difficult to accomplish that well groomed appearance you speak of. It is largely a matter of habit. Absolute attention to everything about your personal appearance, to the smallest detail, with never neglecting one thing, is the only way it can be achieved.

The daily bath is one of the first requisites. If you work, do not get up a half an hour before you should be there and expect to eat breakfast and dress, and appear well groomed. The morning bath in warm weather should be just lukewarm, and need not take longer than five minutes. If you can stand a cold bath, do so. It will soon become a matter of habit to jump from your bed into your tub. Fresh underclothing every morning also. A complete manicure, hair well brushed and dressed, clothes well brushed, pressed, and every hook and eye in place, all these things make up the well dressed woman. Never wear a waist or collar and cuffs slightly soiled, or heels slightly run over.

If you work in an office, keep a powder puff, powder, and nail file there, and be sure you use them at noon and in the evening. It is not easy to do all these things at first, but it is certainly worth while. A dainty, fresh appearance is worth more to a woman than many clothes, and can be achieved without expense.
