MANY PATRONIZE CAMP GROUNDS

Roseburg Has One of Finest Camping Spots in Northwest Tourists Say.

IMPROVEMENTS MADE

Community House, With Fireplace, Library and Writing Desks—Most Popular Place Among Visiting Auto Tourists Here.

Roseburg now has one of the finest auto tourist camp grounds to be found in the entire northwest. A. J. Young, who recently purchased the property there has put in a camp ground that is becoming widely advertised by satisfied tourists and at the present time indications are that it will soon be altogether too small to accommodate the large number of people who desire to make Roseburg a stopping place.

Mr. Young has constructed a fine store buildings in which C. W. Kirk has placed a good stock of groceries and supplies. In the lower part of the building is located an electrician who does electrical work of all kinds.

In the center of the lot is a community house. The front part of the building accommodates a large room for men and women. There is a beautiful brick fire place, in which a fire is kept going every evening. Before the fireplace is a number of easy chairs, and around the walls are writing desks, on which stationery and letter writing materials are found. Magazines, periodicals and newspapers are also kept on the library table in the center of the room. Mr. Young had expected to make his office in the store building but every evening his presence at the community house is in such demand, where tourists want to know everything there is to be known about Douglas county that he has decided to move his offices to the community house.

In the rear of this building he is now constructing shower baths, one for women and one for men. These will be ready in a few days. On the back porch, which is of cement, he has two large stationary laundry trays, which are kept in almost constant use.

In addition to the equipment already provided he is adding 12 stoves, 20 new tables and 20 new benches to the camp ground. He also plans on terracing up some of the hillside land and providing additional camping sites.

Campers in the Roseburg camp grounds are required to pay fifty cents per car each night. The fee is the same regardless of whether the party consists of two or more people.

In return for this fee Mr. Young provides wood, lights and water and the use of the community house, baths and laundry trays.

Practically every person who has stopped at the camp grounds has gone to Mr. Young after their stay and expressed their appreciation of the service given. All agree that the pay camp ground is the proper system and they are willing to pay the nominal fee charged in return for the better service given and the comforts obtainable.

Mr. Young keeps an accurate registration on all parties, taking the name of the head of the party, the make of automobile, the license number and the address of the party. At the end of the year he will be able to make a detailed report on the camp ground.

He permits no advertising or solicitation on the camp ground, and prohibits the passing out of advertising literature. He has nothing for sale except the groceries and supplies carried at the store. The Chamber of Commerce has been asked to supply the rapidly growing library at the community house with maps, bulletins and information concerning Douglas county and will probably take advantage of the opportunity at once.

Already the number of tourists stopping at the camp grounds is surprising. They are on the road early and are from nearly all parts of the country. Several days here and two parties consisting of five people have been here for four days looking for farm property.

Among those who stopped last night were Thomas A. Adams and wife, of Little Rock, Ark.; Hugh Versby and party of six from Ephrata, Wash.; H. Whiting and party of five, from Berkeley, Calif.; C. R. Butterfield and wife, of Bristol, Okla.; J. J. Gingley and party of seven in two cars, from Trinidad, Colo.; rank Teckenby and party of four from Seattle; W. S. Potts and wife of Deer Fork, Wash.; E. P. Corti and wife of Prisma, Wash.; J. A. Corti and wife, of Bakersfield, Calif.; M. M. Bolton and wife of Los Angeles; S. Brooks and party of four from Spokane; J. T. Littlejohn and wife and H. C. Warmoth and family, all of Cottonwood, Arizona, have been spending several days at the camp grounds.

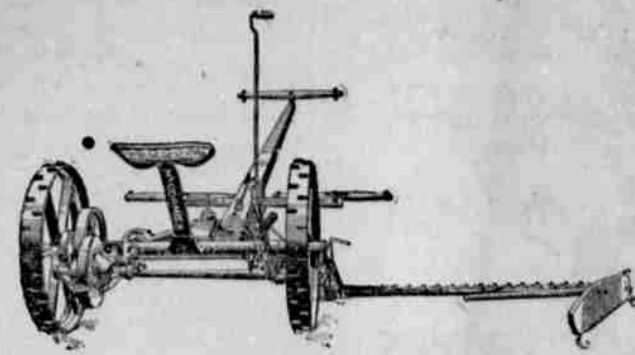

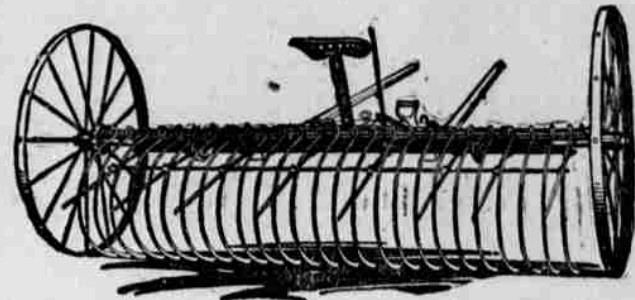
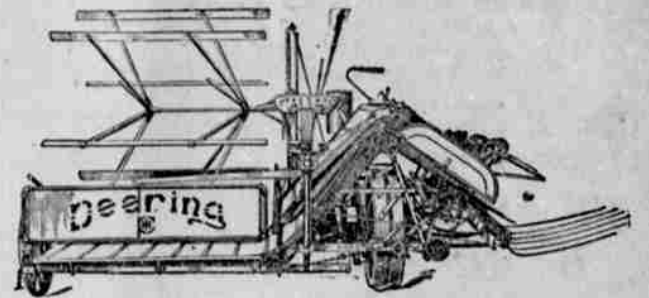

The car belonged to Jason Rust, of Dillard, and was being driven by Esther Fuller. When the machine struck the end of the pavement near the Shady Point railroad crossing it jackedknifed and upset. It rolled over Miss Hewitt, badly injuring her shoulder and breaking two or three ribs. She was brought to the hospital where Dr. Sether attended her. None of the other members of the party were injured. The car was wrecked.

Sealed bids will be received by the county court of Douglas County, Oregon, at the court house in Roseburg, Oregon, at 10 o'clock a. m. on the 24th day of June, 1922, for construction work on a section of road between Siuslaw and the Pacific Highway, known as Sether Section. The work involves approximately 5-8 miles of grading and graveling, the limits being more particularly described as from Eng. Sta. 0 + 00 to Eng. Sta. 22 + 00, in Secs. 23 and 24, T. 32 S., R. 6 W., M. 2 W.

Also for construction work on a section of road between Roseburg and Coler Valley, known as Vinson Section. The work involves approximately 1 1/2 miles of reshaping and graveling, the limits being more particularly described as from a point which bears N. 28° 00' E. from the N.W. corner of Sec. 16, T. 32 S., R. 6 W., 1/4 mile westerly to Umpqua P. O.

Also for construction work on a section of road between Wallowa and Stephens School House, known as Hardin Davis Hill Section. The work involves approximately 1 1/2 miles of grading and graveling, the limits being more particularly described as from Eng. Sta. 0 + 00 to Eng. Sta. 18 + 22.

Also for construction work on three sections of road, between: Dismalville and Carney, as follows:

McLaughlin Hill Section, involving 1/2 mile of grading and graveling, the limits being more particularly described as from Eng. Sta. 0 + 00 to Eng. Sta. 14 + 00, in Sec. 16 and 23, T. 22 S., R. 2 W.

Hooper Section, involving 1/2 mile of grading and graveling, the limits being more particularly described as from Eng. Sta. 0 + 00 to Eng. Sta. 18 + 22, in Sec. 35, T. 27 S.

Duncan Culbert Section, involving the construction of a 6 inch x 8 inch x 24 inch concrete culvert, near the residence of T. E. Duncan in Sec. 3, T. 34 S.
