MAKING RETURNS FOR EDUCATION.

One of the big problems of education is how to provide advanced opportunities for poor boys. The country is full of ambitious young fellows whose parents can't afford a dollar to spend on any college or technical school education. Yet multitudes of them have unusual ability, and are capable of big results if they could get a superior education. While many young people do succeed in working their own way through the advanced institutions, yet it takes a lot of grit and a lot of young people can't see how it can be done. The cost of the higher education is a barrier that deters many who are fitted and worthy to receive its benefits. What the colleges and technical schools need is more scholarships the income of which can be offered to poor boys and girls. The man who has made a success in life and who can see how his education was a tremendous factor in achieving that success, may well make a return for what he has received by providing such a scholarship for the school or college that gave him his start and opened the doors of opportunity to him. The man of wealth and position who makes this return for what has been given him, adds to the welfare and happiness of his country. He helps send out each year some young person into the world who has higher and more intelligent conceptions of life, who will be a force for good government and for civil progress. Also the people who make these generous gifts during their life time, have the warm gratitude of the young folks to whom they have opened life's opportunities. The friendship and affection of those who have received this help ought to count more to a man of wealth and position than any luxury his dollars can buy.

The American Red Cross will retire during June from its relief activities in Europe, having spent in eight years the enormous sum of \$400,000,000. While a large portion of that must have been devoted to caring for American soldiers, yet the greater part of this expenditure represents an unselfish outpouring of American dollars to relieve the suffering of those countries. It used to be said in Europe that Americans are selfish and think only of money. The superb demonstration of charity given through the Red Cross and other agencies should forever kill this slander. Multitudes of families in Europe have been kept alive, made comfortable, healed from sickness, trained for better work, and restored to their usual occupations, as the result of these generous activities. It is an exhibition of broad minded munificence that could not have occurred in former years. But the heart of America is open wider than it used to be.

An effort to raise the standard of efficiency in the building business is being promoted through the organization of the American Construction council, of which Franklin D. Roosevelt is to be chairman. A tremendous addition to the prosperity of the country can be made if this industry can be put on such a basis that the country will have confidence to go ahead and supply its construction needs. The cost of building has not in most places dropped as fast as other elements in the most of living. There is at present a building boom, but to have it fully supply the needs of the country, the industry needs organization so that construction costs can come down to a point comparing with other forms of production.

DRY OFFICERS USE UNIQUE METHODS

Various Methods Employed In Trapping Peddlers of Illicit Booze.

WASHINGTON, May 24.—Buyers of bootleg whiskey visiting the haunts of bootleggers may be buying from government agents.

The answer is that the government is "planting" its enforcement operatives in the bootleg headquarters.

Federal agents are adopting varied disguises. They appear as bums, entering some strange town. They are taken in by the bootleggers, who are moved not by pity, but by the selfish purpose to use the alleged "bum" as a tool to palm off their wares.

The "bum" later turns up in the headquarters of the state prohibition director, with records and charts that offer the key to the bootlegging industry in the sections covered by their operations.

Hotel bootlegging has been curtailed by another very shrewd method of the enforcers. Government agents, skilled in the art of crime detection and wise to the ways of the bootleggers, suddenly show up in the most fashionable hostilities. They are for the time being gentlemen of leisure, with lots of money to spend and with lavish programs of entertainment for their friends.

A hotel guest, on the law of averages, can muster a big flock of guests, without much advance notice, by a pronouncement that he is to have a "rum party." The "boys" fall over each other getting in on the big time. The alleged wealthy host, who has blown in from some more or less indistinct "manufacturing center," is none other than a rum raider. He gains the confidence of the bell boys, the porters and the waiters by his profligate demeanor. He flashes rolls of banknotes with reckless abandon. The tip goes around the hotel that a new "sucker" has arrived. He's the new "fall guy," think these smart young fellows who are lying around waiting to make easy coin on the liquor clean-ups.

The prosperous gent, who idles around with lots of cash, buying dynamic drinks for the crowds gathered about him in his suite of ornate rooms, stays long enough to get the goods and soon disappears amid a lot of kowtowing, but with the stuff that will be used as a basis for indictments.

Battle of Wits.
In the war on illicit distilling in rural districts operatives have been put to their wits' ends. The rural dweller may look the unsuspecting part, but agents have found him the wisest type of "bird" yet encountered. It's a joke among government agents themselves that the "corn kicker" expert would rather take a shot at them with his musket than go to a festival.

Your prohibition raider therefore adopts the simplest ways known to men. He migrates suddenly to the country, with a two weeks' growth of beard, and seeks an humble job in a region suspected of being a moonshine center. He will do any handy thing and is not quarrelsome about the pay. He appears as an honest-looking man wanting work and needing it badly. Sometimes he ventures into the mountain districts. Sometimes he does not come out alive. But that is another story. The odds are in his favor that with caution he will eventually emerge with the proof that the government wants. The disguises adopted in the hunt for liquor makers and vendors are as numerous as the brands of cheap confections that are being peddled
