Humphreys, would not confirm or deny a report Monday that he had received reports from District Attorney Woolwine of Los Angeles containing the names of several Oregon members of the Ku Klux Klan. Humphreys declined to make any statement. It is generally known, however, that government agents have been investigating the activities of the Klan, but it is believed that their operations are being directed from Washington, D. C., and not from the United States attorney's office here.

Big Wool Sale Made Yesterday

PORTLAND, May 23.—The Robert N. Stanfield clip of wool, estimated at 1,750,000 pounds, most of which is still on the sheep's backs, was purchased yesterday by E. J. Burke of this city at a price said to be around 35 cents. The figure given was said by Mr. Burke to be 50 per cent greater than the price paid for the 1921 clip from the same sheep, but four months ago, and 100 per cent greater than the price of wool a year ago.

The transaction is significant of the demand for northwestern wool at the present time and the improved conditions which the wool men are facing.

Yesterday's deal, which involves in the vicinity of \$600,000, was for the wool from all the Stanfield flocks in various sections of Oregon and Idaho, amounting to 200,000 head in all. Shearing has just begun, and the amount of wool can only be estimated now. Mr. Burke said that delivery of the wool would be made in parcels and that the first was expected to arrive in Portland shortly. He said that as delivered the wool would be shipped to eastern markets by water.

Radio Being Used by Forest Service

SPOKANE, Wash., May 23.—While radio fans are putting apparatus factories months behind with orders, and ordinarily rational citizens are turning all thought and conversation to the wireless telephone, R. B. Adams, telephone engineer for the federal forestry department, is devoting further development of radio for use in national forests.

Mr. Adams' interest is in the lone forest patrol man, 50 or 100 miles from his nearest neighbor, who is getting his evening's entertainment from San Francisco through his radio set, and in the fortunes in forests being saved through prompt radio reports of small fires, which are then located and checked before they burn over acres of forest.

Catching the romantic angle of that the radio means to the forest men, Mr. Adams, here in the interests of forest fire prevention, told how the radio came to be used in the forests of the northwest, displacing the telephone, heliograph, and other methods of communication.

Early in 1919, Forester C. E. Graves was interested by department officials in Missoula in the possibility of using radio in our work. I was sent to Washington to get apparatus, and managed to borrow four sets from the signal corps. One of the sets was set up at Lolo hot springs, 30 miles northwest of Missoula, and another at Beaver Ridge, about 12 miles west on the other side of the Blitter Root divide. Through mishaps on the trail, it was necessary to start batteries to the camps three times before they arrived undamaged.

"Our antenna wires were stretched between two tall trees. After several

hours of adjusting, I heard the man at Beaver Ridge call my name. When I answered he shouted, 'Hurrah for the wireless.' That was the first radio conversation in the national forests.

"The signal corps sets were of the 67-A class, a combined transmitting and receiving, five watt output, tube set. The receiving set had one detector tube and two stages of amplification. We felt these sets were too small, as telephones would be cheaper for such short distances.

"The 1920 summer was spent in experiments, and that winter I went to Washington and secured five 50-watt sets, adjusted to give a wave length suitable to our needs. Three of the big sets were put up last June. Despite critics saying we would fall due to being in a mineral zone and absorption by timber, we have had perfect service from them.

"An example of their practical use that summer was shown in a report made by the Moore's camp station to the Edwardsburg station, of a fire burning in the Edwardsburg district, although out of sight of the lookout there. Four minutes from the time Moore's camp saw the smoke, rangers were fighting the fire in the other district. The next day the usual telephone and telegraph reports came from other lookouts to Edwardsburg, telling them of the fire—the first word Edwardsburg would have received without the radio. Catching this one fire early saved enough timber to pay for the radio sets."

WOMAN TO GO ON TRIAL FOR DEATH OF TWO RELATIVES

SHELBYVILLE, Ind., May 23.—(United Press).—Clara Gibson Carl, whose two husbands and father-in-law died with arsenic in their intestines, was to face the judge here today in an alleged "feminine bluebeard" case.

State attorneys will endeavor to prove:

1. That she poisoned Alonzo Carl, her first husband, second husband, in order that a share of his insurance and estate would revert to Frank.
2. That she then poisoned Frank to procure his property and insurance, planning both murders methodically to receive the full financial benefit from them.
3. That she fed arsenic to the old man first rather than to her husband, because to have reversed the order in which they died would have caused her to lose nearly two-thirds of the property both men possessed in its distribution among other heirs.

No charge has been filed in connection with the death of her other husband, Robert Gibson, but acquittal of the charge she now faces is expected to result in action being taken. Similarity of the deaths of the three men aroused suspicion and their bodies were exhumed. Each was said to have died from kidney trouble and to have suffered extreme pains in their intestines.

Down in Hiawatha, Kans., grave diggers brought up the bodies of Frank Carl and his father. Their stomachs were streaked with arsenic, chemists reported. The widow was arrested and a grand jury indictment was returned in Hancock county.

Subsequently Gibson's body was exhumed at Nelsonville, Ohio, and in it too arsenic was found. No additional charge was preferred against the accused woman at the time, in view of the indictment she faced.

Mrs. Carl is 45. She and Robert Gibson used to romp and play in Nelsonville. In their youth they were sweethearts. Later they were married and they went out into Kansas.

There Gibson died and his remains were shipped back home for burial in the family cemetery lot. Then Frank Carl went a-courting. They were married and the elder Carl died. Soon after Frank died on his farm near Greensfield, Ind. The bodies were taken to Kansas for burial.

They both had complained of pains in their backs. Mrs. Carl wrote letters to friends telling them of the circumstances of Frank's death. Something in one letter received in Greensfield resulted in her arrest.

Clark E. Webster, post-office inspector, has started an investigation to learn the author and the publisher.

The book, of 215 pages has upon the front cover a picture of Meghistophiles, a beautiful girl, and a motion picture camera.
