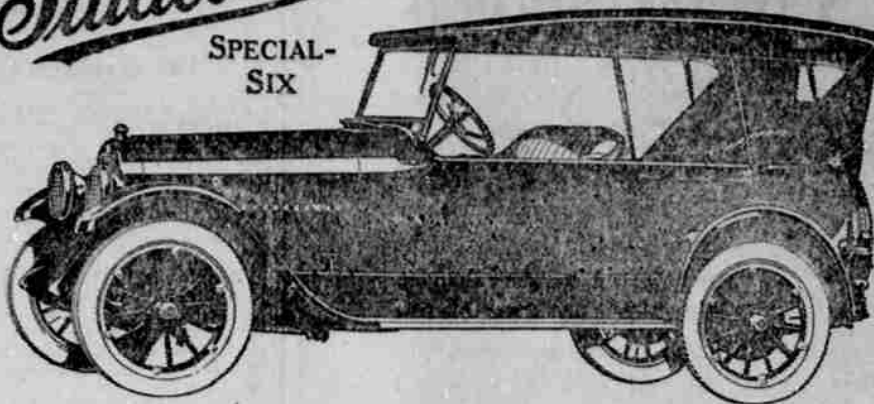

Religious Mania Gripping Belfast

real basis of the hatred is that the decisive battles which secured Protestant succession to the throne of England were fought on Irish soil. In the north of Ireland the Protestant garrison upheld the cause of William III, Prince of Orange, and in the decisive Battle of the Boyne, in 1690, King James, a Catholic, was finally routed by the Protestant army, under the leadership of William himself. James fled to France, and William ascended the throne of England. From this battle there arose a hatred between the Protestants and the Catholics which has been handed down from century to century—a hatred which now centers in Belfast, a beleaguered city.

Time Is No Healing Balm.
Time, which has softened religious animosities in other countries, has not applied its healing balm in Ireland. The bitterest animosities of Catholic and Protestant, handed down from the long past years, live on. In the northern Ireland it is no uncommon thing to see huge placards on the walls bearing the legend, "No Pone Here." These aspersions are met with bitter placards casting reflections upon the memory of William III, the object of the hatred of the Catholics.

Perverse fate has always intervened when it seemed that the two parties to this conflict might wipe out their differences. When the war broke out which swept all Europe the feud between north and south Ireland was renewed with all bitterness. North Ireland objected strenuously to the attitude of South Ireland. Counter charges were flung back and forth across the border.

Then, to add further fuel to the flames, the Sinn Fein became active in South Ireland. A warfare was carried on against Great Britain. North Ireland disapproved. Eventually the warfare spread from the south into Belfast.

Hand of Murderer Unstayed.
The hand of the murderer was unstayed. Protestants charged the murders against Sinn Fein. The religious hatred burst as flame. Catholics were driven from the shynards, despite the fact that not all Catholics were sympathizers with the Sinn Fein. Protestants attacked Catholic premises; licensed public houses, which are largely owned by Catholics, were burned to the ground. The Claims bill for this warfare while the Sinn Fein was fighting the forces of England already amounts to more than \$5,000,000.

Finally came the Irish treaty between Great Britain and South Ireland. The Ulsterites interpreted this treaty as a surrender by British statesmen, and they opposed it. The

centuries-old hatred was again accentuated.

The better class of people among both the Catholics and the Protestants long for peace and use all of their efforts to quench the hatred. The responsibility for the feuds cannot be definitely fixed.

Belfast, the beleaguered city, longs for peace, but religious hatred born centuries ago has prevented.
