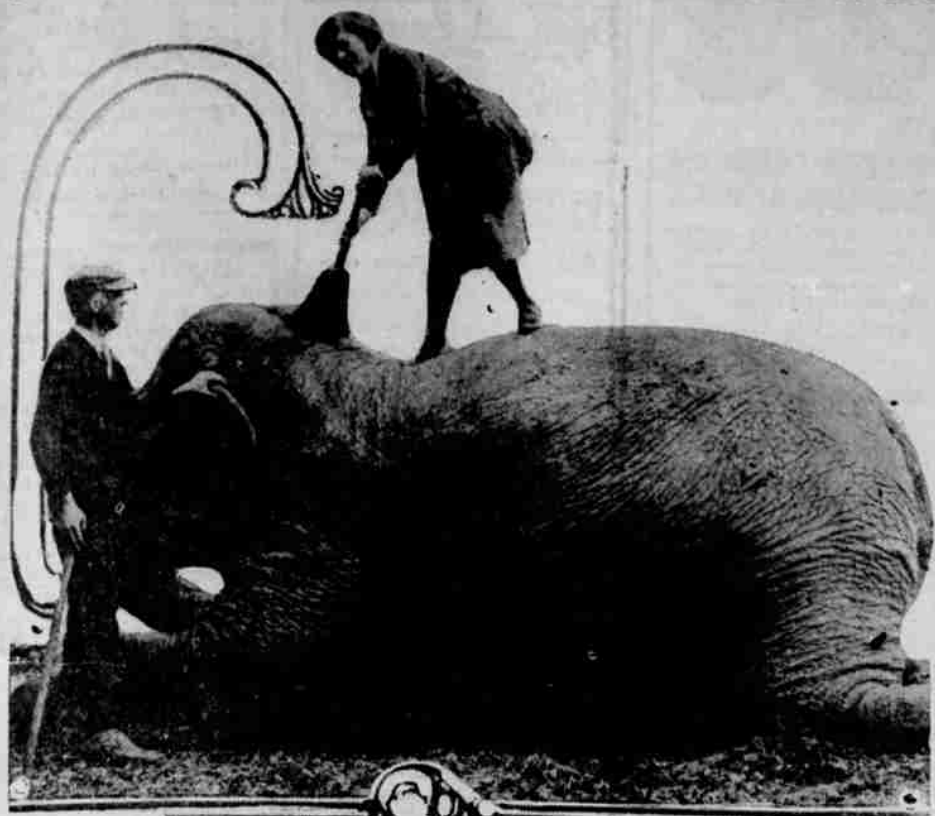


ON TOP AND SHE'S THE BOSS
