FARM NEWS

TOO MANY DIGGERS

(By County Agent B. W. Cooney.)

In the course of each day's field work we have forebore called to our attention the large number of digger squirrels. In times gone by there might have existed some plausible excuse for the number of these rodents. But times have changed and we now have to hand suitable poisoned baits that will wipe out this robber pest at a minimum of time and expense.

We acknowledge the fact that every farmer has to deal with the wild land adjacent to his holdings which act as breeding places for this pest, but this should not necessarily mean that he should quit the good work of killing the pest, no more than he should quit spraying his trees because his neighbor was negligent in doing his work.

The only worth while things done in this world are by those willing to carry on under adverse circumstances. Stop furnishing this pest with crops that should go to buy the things needed in the home.

PURE BRED RAMS AND BILLIES

There will be quite a demand this year for pure bred rams and billies. The breeds which are mostly in demand are the mutton types such as Shropshire, Hampshire and Ramboulette.

Work is being started at this time, to get a list of all county breeders having good purebred rams and billies for sale or exchange. If you have any good animals which you would be willing to consign to a county sale, write the county agent about it as we need the information.

Our plan is to take care of our county breeders first in the sale and exchange before offering animals consigned from outside points. We will also appreciate your call at the office or a letter if you are in the market for some good rams or billies. We need your cooperation in making this sale a success. Dates of the sale will be announced later.

FARM COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE

The county agent and county Horticultural inspector are the farmers service bureau. They want this service to reach you in the largest possible way. In this they are like the average business man, they need, "so to speak," a farm invoice. This invoice is represented by a franked card sent you a few days ago. You can increase their service to you by giving them this information.

Do not fail to sign the card, your name is of vital importance to the office in becoming better acquainted with you and your many problems. It is desired that these cards be returned as early as possible. You may be surprised in the many ways your county agriculturist and horticulturist can serve you.
