GRAND JURY TO HEAR OF FRAUDS

WASHINGTON, May 29.—The special grand jury to hear fraud cases will get to work Wednesday, it was announced today. The first cases will be of former army officers alleged to have accepted bribes for disposal of surplus war materials.

THE PASSING OF MR. BENJAMIN IRVING.

Mr. Irving was born August 18, 1860, at Blair Hill, near Edinburgh, Scotland. He passed away at Roseburg, Oregon, March 23, 1922, after a week's illness.

He received his early education in the public schools in and around Edinburgh. Later he occupied the position of teacher in the department for the deaf at Donaldson's Hospital, the largest and finest foundation school in Scotland. In 1881 Mr. Irving passed seventh on the list of a British civil service examination of a competitive character for positions in the internal revenue department of the British government service. Over seven thousand young men of good education took the examination. In consequence of this Mr. Irving served as a division officer of excise in Scotland and England until his decision to accompany a student friend and companion to the United States in July, 1888. At this time Mr. Irving occupied the civil position of private secretary to Sir Richard Hicks, K. C. H. G., the head of the department of internal revenue at Somerset House, London, England.

After coming to this country Mr. Irving was first employed by the Hallett Bailey Warehouse Co. in San Francisco. In November of 1888 the authorities for the Oregon school for the deaf at Salem solicited him to accept the position of head teacher at that school. The following year the superintendent having retired, Mr. Irving was unanimously chosen to fill the vacant office. He filled the position with honor to himself and credit to his community for ten years. In 1900 he passed the federal civil service examinations and went to the U. S. general land office at Washington, D. C. During his service there Mr. Irving entered as a student of law at the George Washington University and received the degrees of B. L. and M. P. L. and was admitted to the bar in the U. S. supreme court. Mr. Irving was transferred to the U. S. land offices at Great Falls, Montana, and Boise, Idaho, in 1911, and in 1915 to the U. S. forest service at Albany and Corvallis, Oregon. He retired from the government service later and settled on his ranch at Wilbur, Oregon, where he resided until his death.

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In 1890 Mr. Irving married Miss Lois A. Stout, daughter of the Oregon pioneers, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Stout, of Mehama, Oregon. Mrs. Irving is a niece of former U. S. Surveyor General for Oregon Mr. W. H. Byers. Mr. Irving is survived by the widow and the following offspring: Lieutenant Ben B. Irving, an O. A. C. graduate, who served in the U. S. engineers during the world war; Mrs. Iona M. Ferguson, a graduate of O. A. C.; Robert L. Irving, a present sophomore in this same college; Miss Jane C. Irving and Master John A. Irving, students at the Wilbur high school, and the youngest child, Lois A. Irving, a pupil at the Wilbur public school.

Mr. Irving left but one surviving relative across the sea, his sister, Mrs. Margaret Hannen, a resident of the Scottish border.

Mr. Irving was an enthusiastic Free Mason. He joined the craft in Pacific Lodge, Salem, in the early nineties and reached the station of Senior Warden when he removed to Washington, D. C. Afterwards he successfully affiliated with lodges at the na-

A man of rare qualities of character, Mr. Irving was a devoted husband and father. His sterling integrity, his quality of mind, and affectionate disposition exemplified the traits which marked him as a real man among men.

Mr. Irving had a literary ability of a high order. He was recognized as an authority on the history and lore of Scotland. The address he gave at the Turner convention by the Caledonian society of Washington, D. C., received national and international recognition.

As an American citizen, Mr. Irving exemplified the highest patriotic purpose. He served as a member of the committee of American Safety at the doubtful period of the great war.

Mr. Irving's whole life as son, husband, father and grandfather; as a student, teacher, scholar, government official, citizen and friend demonstrated the utmost courage, industry, loyalty, integrity and affection. These qualities make it a joy and a privilege to have possessed his confidence and friendship.

Mr. Irving had an unobtrusive but persistent determination to fulfill his best for the benefit of all. He has left the world the better that he "passed by this way." His life was an exemplification of the one real law: "That ye love one another," and of the Great Master's exhortation that we "Do unto others as we would have them do unto us."

"DUMB-BELL" DRESS FLAYED BY LINDSEY

(International News Service). DENVER, May 29.—Sartorial idiosyncrasies should be included in the "tests" of the Denver juvenile court psychomystical chart, according to Judge Ben B. Lindsey, who declared, in sentencing a youth for delinquency, that oil-smeared hair, bell-bottom trousers, low-cut vests, and "ruff-back" sleep haircuts were an indication of moral weakness. The noted jurist then proceeded to flay "dumb-bell" dress.

Judge Lindsey directed that in the future officers of the court add a notation on the cut of the hair and style of dress to the physiological and psychological data and family history now a part of regular reports on delinquency cases.

Judge Lindsey announced his new found psychological observations

when Howard Crane, nineteen, appeared before him on a charge of having violated a probation he had been placed on after conviction of stealing an automobile. Young Crane left the jurisdiction of the court for two months and went to Texas.

Crane is a tall, stoop-shouldered youth, whose long hair was combed straight back to the collar of his coat and shone like a patent leather shoe—a style which, the court said, is popular among youths brought to court for amorous offenses.

"Son," Judge Lindsey said when Crane appeared looking like a matinee idol, "how did your hair get that way?"

"I use water to make it lay down," Crane responded.

"But why do you cut it that way?" the court asked, continuing:

"It is a stranger thing that haircuts of that type seem to be correlated with a certain kind of weakness. Do you spend your afternoons at drug store fountains sipping lemon cokes through a straw?"

Judge Lindsey declared himself in favor of bobbed hair for girls, but frowned on the "male flapper."

"I only wish I was sending you some place where they would give you a man's haircut," Lindsey announced in sentencing Crane to thirty days in jail.
