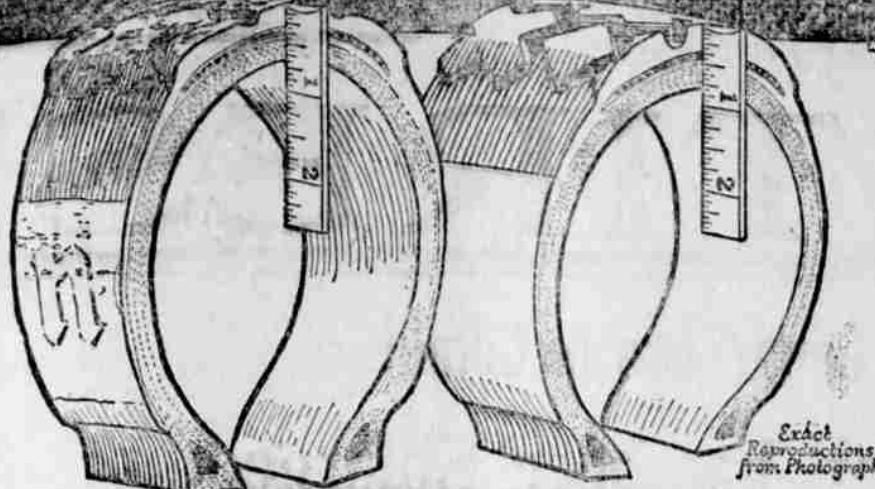

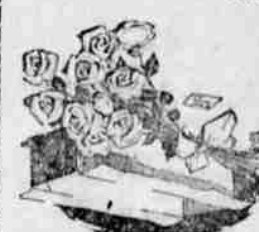

BUSINESS CONDITIONS IN MYRTLE CREEK GOOD

Myrtle Creek Mail: Prospects for a good year in the Myrtle Creek section are pretty fair—they could be lots worse, anyway. Just now the prune crop is coming along fine, and barring unforeseen difficulties, promises to come under the wire next September 100 per cent strong. And prices are not likely to be much below last year. In addition to the prunes, other fruits are apparently up to the average.

The grain crop is showing up fairly well, but the results at harvest are to be determined by the kind of weather handed out during the next six weeks.

The poultry output is up to the average, and many farmers are doing their bit to increase the production of turkeys this season. The sheep men are taking heart again, now that wool is looking up in price, and the gloom of a bad winter is being dispelled. All lines of farm products seem to be improving in price, and with much labor employed the demand promises to be better.

The unusual demand for labor this year will bring much cash into the home channels of trade and those who have been without work for a long time are now doing their bit to bring about renewed prosperity.

We appear in general to be on the up grade now, with a full head of steam and the rails of progress well sanded.
