Community Vacation Bible School Starts

The First Baptist church is sponsoring the first community church vacation Bible school ever held in Roseburg. Parents of other communities have found that it is pleasant and profitable for a part of the vacation period to place their children for a part of the day in vacation Bible schools. No doubt the parents and children of Roseburg will recognize the value in such a school held here. The school which is to begin in the building of the Baptist church is planned as a community affair. Every child in Roseburg of school age up to 14 will be welcome to register. There will be no admission fee nor tuition.

The purpose of the daily vacation Bible school is to direct the energies of the children into wholesome and helpful channels for about two and one-half hours each morning of regular school days. The program each day will contain such features as the salute to the national and Christian flags, patriotic songs, hymns, memory work in the scripture and of the great hymns, a health or habit talk, a graded Bible story, play songs, callisthenics, and handwork suitable for all grades.

Several of the most capable and responsible people of the community have been secured to have charge of this school. Miss Lewis of the high school faculty, who has had much experience in handling young people will be the superintendent. Miss Alice Davis, from the University of California, who last year was superintendent of a school of 350 children in Oakland, Cal., will act as advisor to the teachers.

The school opens next Monday morning, June 5th. Children of every denomination or no denomination will be equally welcome. Registration will likely have to be limited to 500. Registration will be open next Sunday morning at the church school. Children in other Sunday schools may register on Monday morning. Inquiries about the school will gladly be answered by Rev. H. L. Caldwell.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

CLAIMS COUNTRY IS GRIPPED BY WALL ST.

Oakland, Ore., May 26.

Editor News-Review—

The political situation is now a question of whether our country will remain under Wall Street control or revert back to the industrial people. Under the Wilson administration the money was put in circulation so that a dollar was worth only 100 cents, and the industrial people were unable to get full returns for their labor and investment. As soon as the republican party came in control it permitted Wall Street to back up about three-fourths of the money which destroyed confidence among local money investors, causing stagnation of all industry and made the dollar worth about 400 cents. Thus Wall Street speculators attained their object, and bought the people's produce for one-fourth of its value, making about \$10,000,000,000 while the nation at large lost by stagnation of industries about ten times that amount. Be it remembered that while this process was in effect President Harding was telling the people that our great financiers were very busy reconstructing our finances and placing our nation on a solid financial basis. It may be said for Wall Street, but where do the people get off? As a matter of fact, our national affairs are in such a deplorable condition that we cannot judge what the price of any single product will be a month hence. We are absolutely in the power of the most gigantic gang of thieves and bunco steers the world has ever known. If our money was kept in an unchangeable steady flow of circulation the price of staple products would scarcely vary from year to year. Be it remembered that when the democratic party came into control Woodrow Wilson and his colleagues forced the great and powerful Wall Street down on their knees and extracted the billions of dollars from them and placed it out among the industrial people, thus breaking the panic of forty years standing. Fifty years ago there were no millionaires. Now there are billions, and a few years hence there will be trillions, while the industrial people are struggling deeper and deeper in the mire of indebtedness and poverty.
