## PACIFIC LINERS HAVE RADIOPHONE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 2.—(By United Press.)—Radiophones are now a part of the regular equipment of the Matson line trans-Pacific lin- ers. The first vessel to be so equip- ped was the Matsonia, which sailed a few weeks ago for Honolulu.

The new equipment enables the liners to pick up radio concerts, dance music, and news from San Francisco and Portland for over a day's voyage, and for the same time from Honolulu broadcasting stations.

Other trans-Pacific companies are expected to follow suit shortly in the matter of radiophone equipment.

## RENTS MAKE DROP IN LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, June 2.—(United Press.)—Rents in exclusive residen- tial districts are coming down be- tween 10 and 15 per cent, according to a recent report of D. F. Swager, secretary of the housing commission, but in the slums of Los Angeles an attempt is on foot to increase rent.

"Houses, or rather shacks and shacks that could be built for \$50 are rented for from \$25 to \$30 a month. Families are herded like sheep. Sometimes there will be from 10 to 12 persons, including children, in two rooms. Cellars, with water on the floor, and with the plaster falling from the ceiling, have been rented for as high as \$23 a month for one room. Unsanitary houses, without toilets or baths or sinks, rent for \$50 a month."

Swager declares in his report that the reason for this condition is that rich speculators now own this land, and are holding it in hopes of even- really selling it for industrial sites. They therefore are not building any new houses on the land, and are trying to squeeze as large an income as possible out of it until they sell it.

## FOUNTAIN WEIGHS ABOUT 58 TONS

LOS ANGELES, June 2.—(United Press.)—About the time some early Americans were holding a celebrated party in Boston harbor, Spanish padres were building a fountain op- posite their mission at San Fernan- do, near here.

The fountain this week will be moved across the street to ornament the tropical garden of the mission, which is now restored and under charge of the park board.

In preparing to move the foun- tain, Charles Britten, contractor for the park department, discovered the Spanish pioneers built somewhat differently than is the habit of the modern architect of the two-by-four resi- dence.

The fountain weighs only about 58 tons, Britten estimated. The padres had laid first a bed of hard solid cement three feet thick. Then they put over this a layer of red adobe tiles, and coated this fragile surface with concrete four inches thick.

## INDIANS RIGHT TO BE DECIDED

LOS ANGELES, June 2.—(United Press.)—The right of 200 Indians of the Santa Rosa tribe to some 30,000 acres of land will be decided shortly by Federal Judge Benjamin Bledsoe.

The land involved was granted to the Southern Pacific company in 1886 by the federal government, and comprises many miles along the bor- der of the Salton Sea. According to Deputy Federal Attorney Louis Lissner, the land was granted under the clause that it should be void in case other appropriation had been made. Now that the railroad wishes to dispossess the Indians, the govern- ment seeks to rescind the order. Other lands have been offered and re- fused. The Indians, it is claimed, have lived there from time immem- orial, grazing their cattle and grow- ing their crops, and in justice to them the government now seeks to retain their homes for them.

After a short court argument be- fore Judge Bledsoe, both sides agreed to submit the case on briefs.

## Law Enforcement Job Thankless

(International News Service).

CHICAGO, June 1.—Aspirants to the office of law enforcement com- missioner, should be aware that de- cided upon in other cities, take warn- ing!

It is a thankless job.

The Rev. John H. Williamson, law enforcement supervisor of Chicago, and probably the only person hold- ing a similarly titled office in the country, so declared recently.

Its trials and tribulations are man- ifold, but the Rev. Mr. Williamson holds further that eventually it will bear fruit.

Criminals who have despaired of justice, gamblers who have lost their all, parents of delinquent children, nondescript chronic kickers—all these seek out Chicago's "vice may- or" with their applications.

To the innocent onlooker it would seem apparent that the wheels of the enforcement machinery would grind unrestrained with such seemingly endless punishment, but it is not so.

"The drug addict who comes to me for support," Rev. Williamson ex- plained, "readily pours forth his grievances but hesitates in disclos- ing the source of trouble."

"The same with the man who has gambled away everything, and the one who seeks deliverance from the booze dispenser. They will not re- veal the whereabouts of these vice resorts and yet hope to be saved."

Refuses to Give Up.

But the Rev. Williamson, one of a family of five brothers, all of whom possess commendable war records, refuses to believe that his office will not accomplish its purpose.

Should the score of letters which he receives daily from complainants and the no few interviews which he grants fail to furnish substance for his attack on law neglect, the Rev.

## Williamson resorts to a method all his own.

He seeks out the cafe which he suspects of dispensing liquor illegal- ly and waits developments. He visits vice resorts, districts which complain of neglect in cleanliness, families which have been abandoned, and even sits in with a judge to see that the wheels of justice grind to his liking.

The Rev. Williamson has a sys- tematic procedure in his efforts to enforce the law.

"You've got to get at the funda- mental basis of crime before you can deal with it," he declared. "You must have the unflinching support of the police and courts and strive for the sympathy of the people in gen- eral."

Practically all women's clubs of the city and more than 700 citizens have been enlisted by Rev. William- son in the fight against infractions of the law in the two months he has held the newly created office.

"And when I finally know I have the support of the courts in my work," the commissioner said, "you can be sure that violations of the law will be few and far between."

Case on an Aeolian player piano, with his children, George and Eliza- beth, each at another piano, playing the same piece from memory, so per- fect was the rendition of this quite difficult composition for such little tots, that it appeared to be one in- strument being heard. This was a sensation and brought forth rounds of applause, and was the subject of much comment. Neither could we omit mentioning a well played flute solo, "La Cinqtaine," by Gabriel Marie, played by Maxine Moore, who has only recently taken up the flute in addition to piano study. 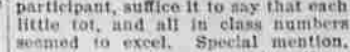
