He recently suffered an abscess of his throat and this broke inside sending the poison throughout his entire system. He became very ill and three physicians have been working over him in an effort to save his life. The letter from Mrs. Bailey stated that he is very low and that little hope is being held out for his recovery.

Mr. Bailey is well known in this city having resided here for a number of years. He was employed by the Southern Pacific until a few months ago, when he accepted a position with F. F. Patterson, resigning this in the spring to take the state appointment tendered him. He was a member of the Douglas County Band while here and has a great many friends who sincerely hope for his immediate recovery.

Ralph Knott of Canyonville, entered a plea of not guilty when arraigned this afternoon before Justice of the Peace George Jones on a charge of breaking quarantine. Evangelist Uses "Liars" for Topic

"Liars" was the subject of Lieutenant Colonel Davis' address last night at the Salvation Army "crusade" in progress here. His text was: "Who among us shall dwell in everlasting burning."

Colonel Davis stated that there were several different kinds of liars and he divided them into their respective classes, assigning them one and all to their place of eternal repose, the "terrible bath."
