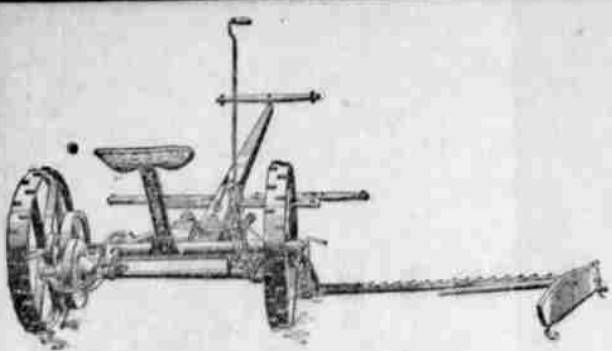

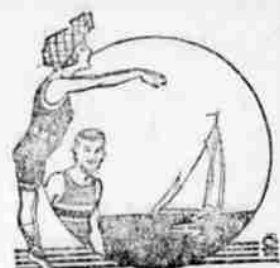
Florence Wharton Given High Honor
