LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

**WRITES REGARDING QUALI-
FICATIONS OF MR. EWING**

Oakland, Ore., May 31, 1922

Editor Daily News-Review:

Now that the primary election has
passed we find that the voters of the
democratic party have nominated W.
B. Ewing, a farmer and stock raiser,
of Oakland, as their candidate for
representative, that the republicans
have nominated J. M. Throne, a bank-
er, of Roseburg, and D. S. Deals, a
banker, of Riddle, both from the south
part of the county.

Judging from the professions of
Mr. Throne and Mr. Deals, one will
arrive at the conclusion that some
voters of the county are contemplat-
ing on putting Douglas county into
the banking business, or else the ma-
jority of our people are bankers.

It is admitted by all that the tax
issue is the big issue of the cam-
paign. It is also admitted that 85 per
cent of all taxes raised are levied on
land, thus leaving only 15 per cent to
be levied on all other property. You
don't have to be an economist to see
there is something radically wrong
with our system of taxation.

Look over the personnel of the last
few legislatures and you'll find that
the farmers and laborers have had a
very small representation and they
have been overwhelmingly republi-
can, but they are never overlooked
when it comes time to pay taxes.

Since a very great majority of the
people of Douglas county are farmers
and laborers, why not send Mr. Ewing
to the legislature? His ideas are
your ideas. Why down him because
he is a democrat?

Once I knew of a small boy whose
father was for McKinley and his
grandfather was for Bryan; this lad
would get on his dad's knee and yell,
"Hurrah for McKinley," for a sack of
candy, go and eat it, then get on his
grandfather's knee and yell "Hurrah
for Bryan," for another handful of
candy.

The principle that this boy illus-
trated is closely followed by some of
our politicians or demagogues, for the
reason that when the democrats are
in the majority they are democratic,
and when the republicans are in the
majority they are republican. In many
cases we vote for democrats running
on the republican ticket.

Why are they so running?
Just for office, that's all.

I say they are neither democrats
nor republicans, but just plain dema-
gogues.

This cannot be said of Mr. Ewing,
as he is a democrat and says so, and

they are in the minority.
Don't you think that 85 per cent of
the taxes being on land would suit the
bankers? We know it's not fair to
the land owners. How are you going
to correct the evil?

By sending more bankers to the leg-
islature?

The tax hits the republican land-
owners exactly as it hits the demo-
cratic land-owners.
The legislature has been so one-
sided that its members wanted to
make an easy job for most of their
friends, so they created needless
boards, bureaus and commissions, so
their friends could be appointed to an
easy job, wear a white collar, silk
shirt, broadcloth pants, etc., and main-
tain a pair of soft white hands.

All these expenses being paid by the
people by way of taxation.

Mr. Ewing is for: Legislation that
will provide a more equitable form of
taxation; an income tax, graduated
rate, or in other words, the greater
the income, the greater the rate of
taxation; consolidation of all needless
boards, bureaus and commissions; is
an advocate of good schools, but is
against extravagance; for a better
system of rural credits and co-opera-
tive marketing.

He is opposed to: Oriental owner-
ship or leasing of lands; further lease-
ment of bonds only where an emer-
gency exists.

Since about 90 per cent of us earn
our bread and butter by the sweat of
our brow, are we going to vote for
our interests or for the interests that
are antagonistic to ours?

Remember, if you please, during
the last few months that many in
our ranks have lost property worth
many times the amount they wished
to borrow, the bankers' vaults were
bulging with currency. Ask him for
a loan? What would he do? Why,
he would give you a John D. look.
That ended it.

Your property would go unless you
had a friend or could take advantage
of the Federal Farm Loan act.

Those two candidates who are can-
didates for representative might have
pruned orchards, but still they are
bankers and think of banking lines.

Mr. Ewing is a man of ability and
integrity, a farmer, and stock raiser,
and that which is to his interest is to
the interest of a great majority of us.

A vote for Ewing is a vote for low-
er taxes.

Ford Turns Out 6,000,000th Motor

Next One Comes Through Five and
One-Third Seconds Later.

Ford Motor Number 6,000,000 was
lifted from the assembly line in the
Highland Park Ford Plant at 9:14 A.
M., May 18th. Just 5 1-3 seconds later
Number 6,000,001 was finished.

The unusually heavy demand for
Ford Cars and Trucks at the present
time has necessitated the building of
5400 motors daily. These are shipped
in carload lots to the various Ford as-
sembly plants throughout the United
States.

The first Model "T" Ford motor
was completed on October 1st, 1908;
number 1,000,000 left the assembly
line December 10th, 1915; and number
5,000,000 came through May 28th, 1921.
Although the Ford Motor Company
turned out a number of different mod-
els prior to 1908, the present number-
ing system began with the first Model
"T."
