Students Show Ability in Finance

The Roseburg high school Student Body association has now a sum (bearing interest) of \$373.91 left to start the school of 1922-23, \$200 of which is allotted to football, \$75 to basketball and \$98.91 to miscellaneous student activities.

The financial success of this student organization this year has been due largely to the patriotic support of the citizens of Roseburg. During the football season the favorable weather combined with large attendance caused \$265.60 to be cleared from this activity and the public's support in the basketball season made it possible for the S. B. A. to realize a profit (\$25) from basketball—the first time in many years. The S. B. A. council worked very hard for this showing and handled the money with strict economy in order to bring about these results. It is notable that the S. B. A. began the school year of 1921-22 with a debt of \$57 and that within two months \$275 was deposited at interest to help finance the publication of the annual, besides successes above mentioned.

From all indications the S. B. A. will be very active next year aided largely by the big amount left over from the year just ended. This amount of money is the largest that has ever been left over from one year to the next in the history of the Student Body association. It should firmly convince the merchants and citizens that this organization, run by students, is solvent and can be credited for properly requisitioned purchases without doubt of payments.

IRISH STEAMER SEIZED BY BRITISH

LONDON, June 6.—A steamer from New York, Fenit, bound for Kerry, with corn and a mixed cargo, has been held up in Tralee bay by a British sloop. A large quantity of ammunition in bar-

rels was seized.

The British troops have driven the Sinn Fein invaders from their main positions in the Ulster territory and a large part of the border between northern and southern Ireland is now virtually a battlefield. The village of Pettigo on the Fermanagh-Donegal border, was recaptured from the Sinn Fein invaders yesterday and the southern forces were also reported to have evacuated Belleek, 10 miles south-west.
