ROSE SHOW AGAIN ANNUAL FEATURE

Interest Shown by Rose Growers all Over County—Many Will Enter

LISTS ARE ANNOUNCED

Flowers Divided Into Several Sections for Judging—Woman's Club Gives Suggestions for Those Who Will Enter Roses.

The plans for the Roseburg Rose show are going forward with great rapidity and the Woman's club, which is sponsoring the show, feel greatly encouraged by the prompt response and interest of rose growers and others. Many residents who are noted for their beautiful roses have promised to have their choicest specimens on display at the J. O. Newland and Son garage where the show will be held, starting Friday.

Roseburg has always been famed for her flowers of all kinds especially the roses, and many feel that the annual rose show which formerly marked the high spot in the flower season should not have been discontinued. In the event that the display is a success this year, the Woman's club will probably make it an annual event.

In order to help those who expect to enter flowers in the rose show, and to aid them in classifying their roses, the following classification list has been announced, also a few suggestions as to cutting and caring for the flowers:

Section A—Best three roses of any one named variety: Class 1, white; class 2, light pink; class 3, bright pink; class 4, red; class 5, yellow; class 6, blended colored.

Section B—Class 1, new and unusual, one or more roses, one named variety.

Section C—Climbing roses, spray not less than 12 inches. Class 1, flowered; class 2, Polyantha climber.

Section D—Single flowered and miniature roses: class 1, display of best brier or single flowered roses of any one named variety; class 2, display of best baby or polyantha roses of any one named variety.

Section E—Collections of five named varieties, one color: Class 1, white; class 2, pink; class 3, red; class 4, yellow; class 5, blended colored roses.

Section F—Collection any colors, not less than ten named varieties, in baskets bowls or vases, furnished by exhibitor: Class 1, best display of roses as above.

Section G—Sweepstakes rose. Best specimen rose. Entrance fee 10 cents. Prize, all entrance fees.

Prizes in all classes unless otherwise stated, first \$150; second \$1.

The room will be open to receive the roses at 8 a. m. Friday, and we hope all who can will bring them early to accommodate those who cannot. The time for entries is extended to 12 o'clock.

Those who can be requested to renew their exhibits Saturday morning, but the judging is based entirely on the Friday exhibit.

The following suggestions for cutting and caring for the roses are taken in substance from the Portland Rose magazine:

Experts differ as to the best time to cut roses for exhibition. Some prefer to cut them the evening before, keeping in a cool place over night. Others recommend the early morning, meaning by early, before sunrise. The temperature of the water in which they are placed is also essential. It should never be more than a few degrees colder than the atmosphere, but all agree to place the cut flowers in deep water, almost up to the flower, for several hours. When transporting them wrap the stems tightly with well wetted newspaper and cover the outside with dry paper.

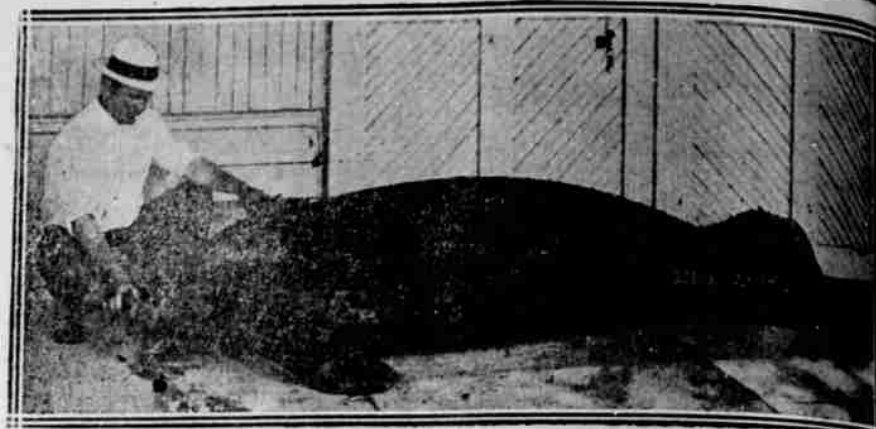

Giant Manatee Is Captured in Florida.

TAMPA, Fla., June 6.—Tampa's permanent museum of natural history, which is being gathered for educational purposes and which is a feature each year of the South Florida Fair, has been enriched by two splendid specimens.

The first was the skeleton of a mammoth whale located on Crystal river by H. L. Ferguson, naturalist and taxidermist of Boca Grande. On his trip to Tampa, bringing the

whale skeleton, Ferguson noticed off Pinellas Point a giant manatee, the largest he had ever seen.

As the manatee is almost extinct, a fine of \$500 is assessed in cases where the sea cow is killed without permission, so upon reaching Tampa Ferguson secured the necessary permit from the county commissioners and returned to capture his prey.

He was too late. Two fishermen going earlier in the day to see what

their nets contained found the mammal within. A single flipper tail upset the boat, but fortunately the water was shallow and the animal was killed before it could escape. A load of buckshot ended the life of the manatee.

The animal was found to weigh 1,320 pounds and was prepared for placement in the museum. The last manatee previously reported killed in these waters weighed 1,000 pounds.

Will Detour Through Garden Valley

The county road crew is busily at work repairing and improving the road from Roseburg to Wilbur by way of Garden Valley. This road will be put into use as a detour in a few days as the paving operations between Roseburg and Wilbur are preventing travel over the highway. The highway is being graded between Roseburg and Winchester at the present time, and within a few days it will not be possible to use the Winchester detour which is now being followed. The Garden Valley road is in very good condition and will easily handle the traffic. The narrow places along the river are being widened and other improvements made. Contractor Metzger will start the work of paving the Edenhower road in about ten days, but travel will be detoured alongside of the regular roadway.
