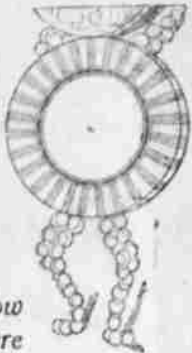

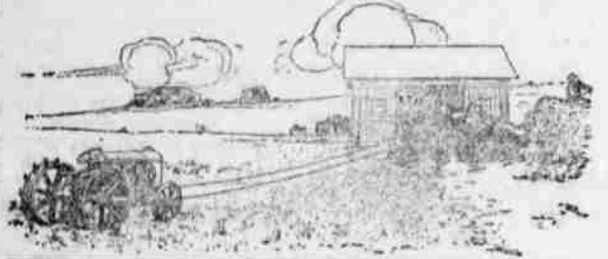

Contract Is Let for Science Church
