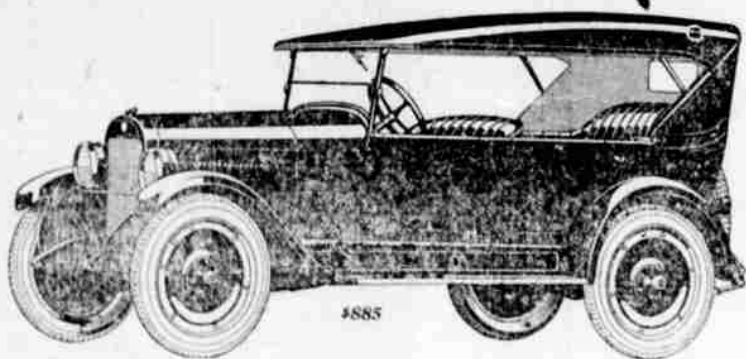

BRIDGE AT GLIDE TO BE ADVOCATED

Chamber Commerce to Send Committee Before Court To Work For Bridge.

TO ELIMINATE FERRY

Would Do away With Lone Rock Ferry and Would at the Same Time Accommodate Many People Living on Opposite Side of River.

The construction of a bridge across the North Umpqua at the Hughes ranch near Glide, will be urged upon the county court by a large Chamber of Commerce committee which is to go before the court as a delegation on Friday morning. The court has long been contemplating a bridge at Lone Rock where a ferry is now kept. The traffic is so heavy that some change is deemed necessary immediately. The county court had planned on moving two highway bridges, one from Drain and another from Oakland, to Lone Rock, but this proposition has almost been abandoned, as there is so much opposition. The court and practically all who have investigated the matter, believe that a new bridge is necessary. It is now proposed, however, to build it at the Hughes ranch. This bridge would be much shorter and less expensive, and the money saved would be sufficient to build the necessary road up the opposite side of the river. The bridge there would accommodate many more people and would serve the community better.
