PRIMARY SYSTEM
MEETING PROTESTCounty Central Committees
Over State Are Con-
demning System.

COST IS TOO GREAT

Benton County Is the Only One
Which Has Endorsed the Present
Primary Law—Legislature
Expected to Act.

PORTLAND, June 12.—A rising

of protest and complaint against

the present primary nominating sys-

tem is spreading throughout the

state and throughout Oregon. This

movement is not confined to one party.

The advocates are found among

Republicans and Democrats alike.

It is now a foregone conclusion

that at the next session of the legis-

lature, January, 1923, many amend-

ments will be offered, each calculated

to give the weak spots in the law.

A dozen drafts of tentative

amendments are now being drawn

up by the lawmaking body for

consideration.

Primary Adopted in 1904.

The direct nominating primary

was adopted by the people at a

general election in June, 1904,

and in the last 18 years the elec-

tion has had ample time in which

to observe closely the workings of

the law and its good and bad qual-

ities. For some time past, irritation

and dissatisfaction have been shown

by the direct primary and now the

law is being officially criticized

by various political bodies.

Direct attack was made on the

primary system at a democratic

meeting held in Portland two years

ago, and among other things, the

primary was charged with responsi-

bility for the democratic party go-

ing to seed in Oregon.

Fixing Declared Needed.

The original champions of the

primary who ardently advocated it as

a means of saving years ago have now come

to modify their views and confess

that the law needs "fixing." The pri-

mary did away with the party boss, but raised a crop of lesser bosses, beholden to no party organization. The state of Washington, which adopted the primary system after Oregon led the way, is now in revolt against its particular primary law and both parties, through their leaders, are determined to provide amendments which experience has demonstrated are essential.

In the last ten days many republican county central committees have been organizing in Oregon. Several have adopted resolutions demanding either the abolition of the direct primary or its modification. Only one county—Union—has come forward with resolutions offering re-affirmation of the primary law and a statement of allegiance to the primary law.

Present System Opposed.

Lane county republican committee resolved itself as "unalterably opposed to the present primary system as written on statute books of Oregon."

Union county republican committee favors a change in the system and approves the New York primary plan, which had the sanction of Col. Roosevelt. The state committee from Union county, Bruce Dennis, has been instructed to urge upon the state committee the need of an improvement in the present primary, and ask that organization to work to the end that a campaign of information regarding the New York plan be started in Oregon.

Benton county republican committee has gone on record expressing its belief that "the primary law in Oregon is inimical to party government and therefore to the best government; that it encourages perjury; that it is inordinately expensive both to the state and county as well as to the candidate; that it tends to discourage the state's best men from striving to enter public service; that it is immensely advantageous to the rich and disadvantageous to the poor, other things being equal; that it encourages self-seekers and incompetents to run for office."

Taxation Increase Cited.

Douglas county republican committee holds that the primary system is largely responsible for the great increase in taxation and declares that every vote cast in the primaries in Douglas county last month cost the taxpayers of the county approximately \$1.00. Also, contends Douglas republicans, the primary is causing factions and feuds and destroying the party vote at the general election and it is also destroying the political parties by preventing them from advocating a platform on which to require office-holders to stand. Douglas wants a convention

system with a party platform.

Marion county republicans point out the heavy cost of taxpayers and candidates and say: "Without the benefit of the primary system or impairing its value in giving the people within the party a rightful expression as to their choice of candidates, we demand the restoration of the right to hold county and state conventions, not only with intent of maintaining our own party organization, but as being vital to the existence of popular government."

No formal resolutions on the primary were adopted in the organization of the Tillamook county republican committee, but members, speaking individually, expressed themselves as strongly favoring some change in the law. A similar situation developed in Yamhill county.

Expense Main Indictment.

Thus far the main indictment against the primary is its expense, its disruption of party councils through convention, its waste of ill-fueling, its permitting candidates to run wild on any sort of platform they may care to put forth without responsibility to party and the strange quirk which permits candidates to be put into the field by secret societies and yet which prevents political parties from doing that very thing.

Apparently, when the republican state central committee meets in the near future, the matter of the direct primary law will be taken up in formal manner with, possibly, a resolution requesting the legislature to submit a suitable amendment to the people. The primary law, being an amendment to the constitution, if amended at all, will require a vote of the electorate.
