WASHINGTON, June 13.—The seaplane floating dock which has been under construction at Sheerness Dockyard, England, has been delivered to the Air Ministry as ready for service, according to information to the war department.

The dock has an overall length of 142 feet and a lifting capacity of 200 tons. It will accommodate two large modern seaplanes.

AIR SERVICE SCHOOL INCREASES EFFICIENCY

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Rapid strides have been made by the Trade Test Department of the Army Air Service in reducing the number of failures at the Chanute Field (Illinois) Air Service Mechanics School, according to reports to the War Department.

From December, 1919, to July, 1921, the reports show, the department succeeded in reducing the failure rate of this school by approximately 50 per cent. Only 22 per cent of the students were dropped during this period for ineptitude, as compared with 32 per cent prior to December, 1919.

SEASON'S CANTALOUPE YIELD IS PLENTY

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Cantaloupes will be plentiful in the United States this year, according to the Department of Agriculture.

Reports to the department show the acreage of this luscious fruit in various of the late-producing states to be 54,736 acres, as compared with 47,230 acres in 1921.

Colorado has the largest acreage, with 12,000 acres; Arkansas, with 5,140 acres; California, with 7,350 acres; and Maryland, with 6,310 acres, are next in the order named.

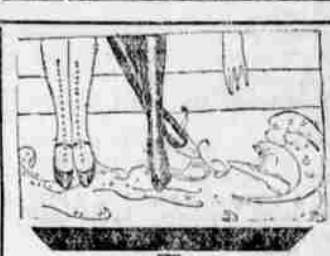
