Mounting our tire on a wheel and dropping it several times from the fourth story of our main factory building did not dislocate or do any damage to the bead or carcass.

We tried repeatedly to effect a dislocation of the bead by over-inflating our tire. In this we were unsuccessful.

Placed on runs where the tread wears more quickly than usual, Savage Cords averaged 20% better service on their original treads than the total previous mileage secured from other makes of tires used under similar conditions.

SMALL TOWN BAND PRAISED BY DAVIS

Pres. Harding Once Played In Band at Home in Marion, Ohio.

PROPOSES A BUREAU

Would Develop Home and Community Music—Secretary of Labor Says Band Is the Finest Thing Going.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Secretary of Labor Davis, who played the clarinet in the town band in Sharon, Pa., many years ago, is advocating the creation of a federal bureau of recreation for the development of instrumental and vocal music, the drama, the theater and athletics throughout the United States.

"To my mind," the labor secretary said, "there is no greater influence for community and social good in the American small town of today than the town band. Some of the pleasantest recollections of my life carry me back to the days when I played the clarinet in the Sharon band."

It is Secretary Davis' idea to have the proposed bureau of recreation cooperative with the states and the individual communities in developing home and community music.

"As to music I would adapt the Elstedfeld idea of Wales to America," he said. "That means the organization nationally of instrumental and vocal music, the theater and all other recreations. This national organization must begin in the individual community. I believe that all municipalities should have recreational leaders. I would have every form of recreation, so that the humblest citizen could really take part and enjoy it."

"The power of music," Secretary Davis added, "is the most universal of arts and has been recognized from the dawn of civilization. Down the long centuries from the dim ages to today humanity has marched or danced, plodded or gimbled its way of progress under the inspiration of music."

He said that America can be organized musically, because most American workmen receive a saving wage, pointing out that there are 40,000,000 people gainfully employed in this country.
