CITY WILL HONOR FOUNDER

Rio de Janeiro to Erect Monument to Estacio de Sa, Regarded as First Settler.

One of the landmarks of Rio de Janeiro has been a hill about 300 feet high in the heart of the city, called the "Morro de Castello." A chapel crowned the top, and there was the tomb of Estacio de Sa, who with his brother, Salvador de Sa, shares the title of founder of the city. Salvador was drowned at sea, so only Estacio could be entombed. Nearly the chapel on the hill was a stone something like a milestone, bearing the date 1507, and called the foundation stone.

On January 20 Rio de Janeiro celebrated the three hundred and fifty-fifth anniversary of its founding. As it had been decided to raise the hill and so make available valuable land, on that day the ashes of Estacio were taken from their long-time resting place and carried in an army wagon to the monastery of the Capuchins at the beginning of the ascent of the mountain Tijuca. In another wagon was the foundation stone, followed by a long procession composed chiefly of Roman Catholic religious bodies.

After the ground where the hill was is properly prepared a monument to commemorate the founding of the city will be erected in the same place, and the remains of the founder and the foundation stone will be put there.

OUTDOES RAVEN OF FICTION

New York Bird Believed to Be the Champion Talker of the Feathered Tribe.

Meet a rare bird from Australia! He is coal black, with white china eyes, a wicked laugh and a trick dance that he does in his cage on top of the ice box in a Bronx park tea room. He sits there next to the root beer barrel and is willing, say his managers, to challenge all birdland to a talking match, according to the New York Sun. When it comes to quoting short and pithy phrases Poe's raven, with his "Nevermore" recitative, was merely an also ran.

This bird doesn't know how he got here. He remembers being somewhere out in the suburbs of Sydney on a summer night. Then he was trapped and out on the high seas before he knew what was happening.

Now he lives in Bronx park and never a bird in a gilded cage has as fine a line of pattern as this old raven. Perhaps he is segregated so he will not teach the whole parrot house to jeer at Sunday afternoon visitors. He can talk in a rich, deep barytone voice such as never belonged to a parrot and can interpose intervals of falsetto. At the end of every speech he hops down and does a double shuffle dance. Then he laughs at the audience.

For here in St. Louis is a grandmother in possession of all the attractions customarily reserved for flappers—laughing eyes, impatient young feet and the faculty of wearing smart sport hats and sweaters in the most flapperish manner.

She is Mrs. Joseph E. Dehner, 33, married at 14, a mother at 15, and a grandmother at 33.

When Mrs. Dehner was 14 she left her home to elope with the man of her dreams then a youth of 23. "I have a funny habit of keeping

my husband in love with me, too," Mrs. Dehner says. "He thinks I'm younger-looking than I ever was."

YELLOW-RESISTANT CABBAGE VARIETIES

About 4,000 Pounds of Seed Produced in Washington.

Department of Agriculture and Wisconsin Experiment Station Been Investigating Disease and Assisting Growers.

About 4,000 pounds of cabbage seed of the Wisconsin All Seasons variety, which is highly resistant to the disease known as "cabbage yellows," was produced in the Puget Sound section of Washington during the season of 1921. Cabbage yellows is caused by a fungus which is capable of persisting in favorable soils indefinitely and causes serious crop losses in infested regions. Disinfection of the seed reduces the danger of carrying other cabbage diseases to new districts, but the investigations of the University of Wisconsin have shown that the selection of resistant varieties offers the only way of preventing loss from yellows.

The United States Department of Agriculture, in co-operation with the Wisconsin experiment station, has for some time been investigating the disease and assisting growers and packers in the production of cabbage seed of the yellow-resistant strains on a commercial scale and in the field.

Inspection of the seed crops. In addition to the All Seasons, several hundred pounds of Wisconsin Brunswick seed, another yellow-resistant variety, have also been produced.

One result of the investigations thus far is the development of these yellow-resistant varieties. Through the commercial cabbage growers and kraut packers a supply of the yellow-resistant cabbage seed is available to the growers in sections where these types of cabbage are needed. Resistant strains of other varieties, including Hollander, All Head Early, and Copenhagen Market, are being developed and will be propagated for distribution in the near future.

WHY PUREBRED SIRES EXCEL

Ratios Between Males and Females in Different Classes of Stock Kept for Breeding.

If you are ever inclined to doubt the importance of the quality sire, a glance at the figures below will reassure you. They represent the ratios between males and females in different classes of live stock kept for breeding purposes. The figures are based on a survey of more than 200,000 head of live stock of all kinds made by the United States Department of Agriculture.

Cattle—1 bull to 18.5 cows.
Horses—1 stallion to 15.9 mares.
Swine—1 boar to 11.5 sows.
Sheep—1 ram to 37 ewes.
Goats—1 buck to 25.5 does.
Chickens—1 rooster to 22.3 hens.

Other poultry, geese, ducks, turkeys, etc. (average)—1 male to 8.5 females.

These figures are taken from more than 2,000 farms in various parts of the country, and are believed to be typical of average conditions the country over. Since the sire is the parent of so many more offspring than the female, the importance of using a purebred sire of individual quality and excellence can hardly be overemphasized. There may be cases where scrub dams are wisely tolerated, but it is almost criminal to propagate undesirable characteristics by using scrub males.

HOW FIRST LOCK WAS MADE

Development of the Key Reveals an Interesting Story of Ages Long Passed Away.

The modern lock is a development of the horizontal bar placed across the inside of the door. This was a good substitute for a lock when one remained inside, and to adjust it so that it would fall into place when the door was closed from the outside was comparatively simple, but to lift the bar from the outside when one wished to enter, was the problem. This was accomplished by fitting a hole into the door post, through which something designed to lift the bar was inserted. This was the first keyhole and the instrument used in lifting the bar was the first key, says the Brooklyn Daily Eagle.

The simplest idea for preventing the bar from sliding was to bore a hole in the top of the bar, which would also penetrate the staple on which it rested, and drop a peg into the hole through the staple. The unlocking problem could be accomplished by any instrument which would lift the peg and permit the bar to slide back. Then if a series of pegs were used, all of which had to be lifted, unlocking would be more difficult. In our modern locks, the pegs have simply been replaced by "tumblers" on which the key acts in the same way. The key originally had wooden pegs fastened to correspond with the pegs holding the bar in place on the inside, and these pins developed into the notches which are on our modern keys. As there were no pockets in those days the other end of the key was made into a ring and worn on the finger. That is why the keys of today usually have a ring at the end—just a relic of the past.

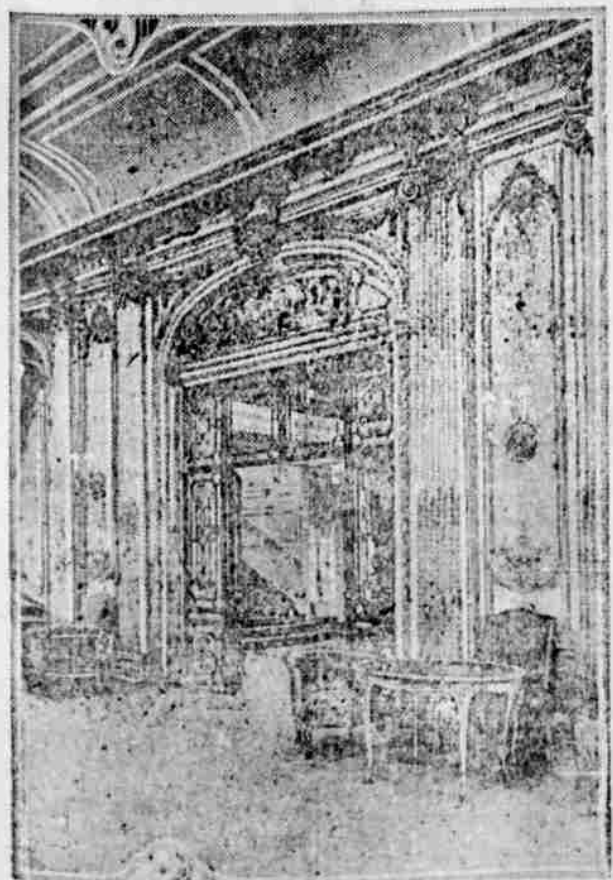

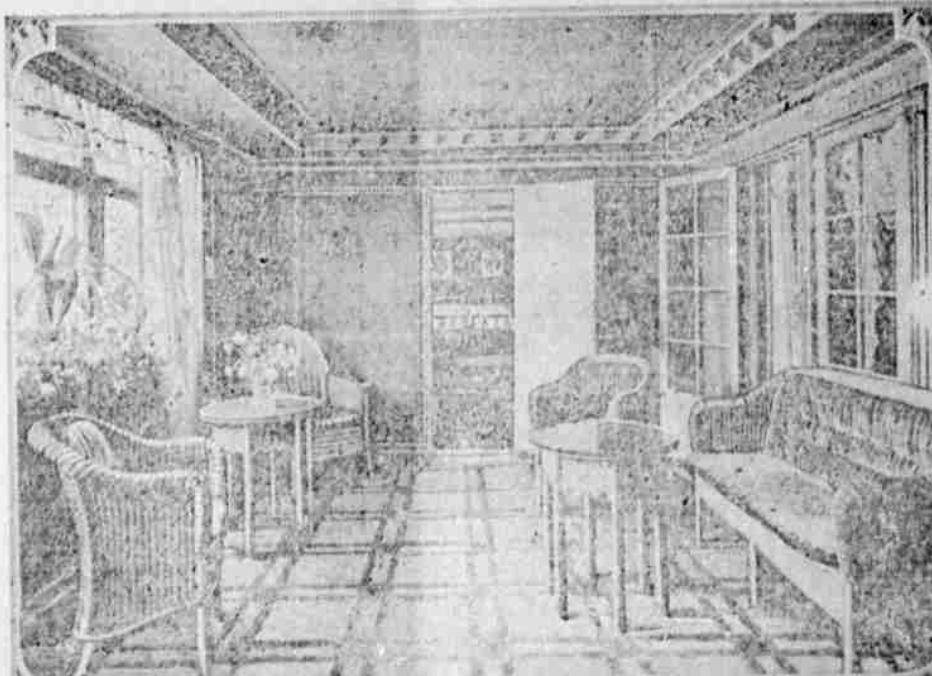
Stage and Dance Floor in Lounge
