

What about carbon?

ASCOT, June 22.—Ankles are now taboo, but one may feast their eyes upon shapely, and unshapely, arms to their hearts content.

Ascot styles this season, if today's showing is any criterion, demand that the ankles, of which we have seen so much, must be hidden beneath long skirts. Arms have come out of captivity, however, and the majority of the gowns seen upon this famous and artistic race course are either totally sleeveless or have sleeves which are flowing and slashed widely from elbow to shoulder.

Queen Mary, the long-time champion to the long skirt, has met with success. Perhaps it is due to the edicts of French modistes more than to the Queen, but at any rate the gowns are long skirted. But how the arms have blossomed out! It is a matter of choice now whether the ankle or the arm is more pleasing to the eye.

Many of the long skirted gowns are set off with flowing cape effects and the hats are all wide and floppy brimmed, with the exception of that worn by the Queen, who always attracts the toques.

Organdie is the favorite material for Ascot gowns—and such organdies, all in delicate tints of lemon, bluish pink, sky blue, crepe marocain, georgette and dyed laces also are well favored.

Beige colored Swiss embroidery is another material which is being effectively used. These dresses have pretty flower girdles in colors which match hat and sunshade. Yes, indeed, the sunshade is in favor, safely ensconced on the pedestal of English racing fashions by the Queen and Princess Mary, who both appeared at the Derby with beautiful blue sunshades.

Lines of the throat and shoulder in Ascot gowns are generously displayed, boat-shaped collars giving this effect. When there are sleeves, they are wide and flowing, slashed liberally, and often there are side panels that droop slightly below the hem of the skirt on each side.

Hand bags have again become a necessity to the well-dressed woman. Little bags of cloth or silver being the most popular among those who crowd the grandstands.

Fresh flowers are being used profusely by both men and women. The King and the Duke of York have revived the boutonniere.

Altogether England's womanhood never was better dressed than at this season's Ascot.

FRILLS AND RUFFLES ARE SUPPLANTING MANNISH SEVERITY IN APPAREL



CHICAGO—The day of mannish severity in feminine apparel is waning. The tendency is for dainty frills and ruffles of lace and embroideries in costumes, as concealing and demure as those worn a half century ago by the girls who are grandmothers today. This decided change, which comes perhaps as a reaction to wartime freedom in dress, is being more talked of every day by close students of fashion both in France and America. Evidence of the increasing use of lace was cited by Frank Hatch, head of the Zion Lace Industries of Marshall Field & Company, at the recent Chicago meeting of the Fashion Art League of America.

"The cycle of dress, revolving slowly, approaches again a period when feminine apparel reverts to a softness of silhouette, a shadowiness of outline," he said. "Lace and embroideries are coming into use wherever there is the slightest chance for them." He told of the greatly increased demand for silk Spanish all-over designs, replicas of antique hand made laces, with which afternoon and evening gowns are being made.

Perhaps the swing of the pendulum of fashion is due to a reaction from the era of short skirts and rolled down stockings—the post war days of more hilarious living and greater frivolity in dress. Longer skirts, an increase in home sewing and the wider use of lace and embroideries promise the growth spirit of conservatism in apparel.

The sketch to the left was made of a costume with an all over Spanish black silk lace. Such a costume can be worn with any of a number of different colored slips, giving the wearer several dresses in one. The slips usually are of crepe de chine, satin or Georgette. The dress sketched in the right hand illustration is typical of the new Colleen type, with ruffles of embroidered batiste edged with Irish crochet.

DATES FROM SIXTH CENTURY

Oldest Known Latin Extant Is Not Epigram, but Decidedly Comical in Expression.

Those who swear by the classics, and believe that in them is set down all wisdom, as well as those who flout this view for old foreboding, may be surprised to learn that the oldest known Latin extant, dating according to most scholars, as early as the Sixth century, B. C., is neither a fragment of an old law carved in crumbling stones nor a scrap of old parchment containing a calendar proclamation.

Instead it appears on 60 frivolous as a piece of jewelry, a gold brooch, and that not made for a woman, but meant to be worn by a Roman patrician to fasten the folds of his toga at the shoulder. The motto on the piece is nothing that could be carved on a cornerstone, nor is it suitable for printing on a state seal. It is only a journeyman jeweler's mark, and may be translated "Manus Made Me for Numanus."—From the New York Sun.

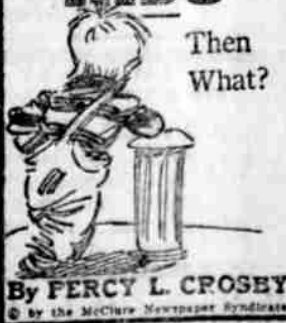

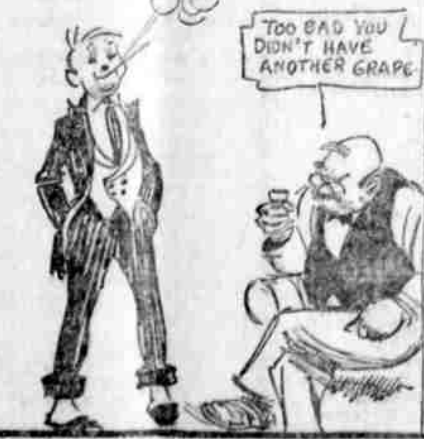
