DOUBLEHEADER BALL GAME IS ARRANGED

Dillard and City Team Play First Contest This Afternoon.

GOOD GAMES EXPECTED

Twilight League Picked Team to Meet Winners of First Contest—Large Crowd Present Guarantees Profit for Library.

A big crowd turned out this afternoon for the library benefit baseball game played at the Laurelwood ball park. Those arranging for the game sprung a surprise on the audience when they announced a double header, the first game between the Roseburg and Dillard teams, the winners to play a picked team from the Twilight League. The Dillard team was unable to come because of the inability to obtain a battery and the crack Dillard team was brought in. Practically all of the merchants of the city cooperated by closing their places of business for the game and as a result the crowd was considerably swelled. A number of the musicians of the concert

band turned out and played a number of excellent band selections prior to the game and at various times during the two contests. The first game started shortly before three o'clock and from early indications promised to be one of the best ball games local fans have had a chance to witness this season.

All proceeds from the game go into the library building fund as a part of the campaign for the construction of a public library building. It is evident from the attendance this afternoon that a good sum will be realized for this purpose.
