Club Workers Are Having Good Time

COVALLIS, June 23.—"We're having a wonderful time," chorused eight Douglas county young people attending the annual two-weeks' session for members of boys' and girls' clubs at Oregon Agricultural college, in answer to a question put by the reporter.

The club sent us, we want to learn all we can to take back to the other members," said an eager-looking girl from the Looking Glass club. Two hundred and forty boys and girls from all parts of the state are attending the conference.

Regular classes are scheduled for the morning, while the afternoons are devoted to a general assembly and recreation. Classes are conducted in faculty members of the college, and the young people are under the supervision of their club leaders and of a reception committee.

The boys are studying such agricultural subjects as stock judging and hog judging, soils, corn and potatoes, milk testing, poultry raising, gardening, sheep raising, and fruit growing.

The boys are divided into groups, and classes are scheduled at different hours on alternate days, to enable the boys to receive instruction in a wide range of subjects.

Classes for girls are divided into

sewing, cooking, home-making, and canning. In the cooking classes such subjects are studied as bread making, candy making, meal planning, food setting and serving, and feeding for health. There are also demonstrations and exhibits.

The division of home-making includes lectures on such subjects as "tools to make housework easy," "an efficient kitchen," "make your head save your back," "household pests," "my yard—its care and what to plant," and painting demonstrations and exhibits.

Forty-eight of these children are winners of prizes at the state fair. Their expenses are paid by business men of Portland and by the state live stock association. Others are sent by the clubs as delegates on the money raised by entertainments, etc., and some pay their own expenses.

Douglas county youngsters attending the conference are Edgar Howard from the Green district; Kathleen Michaels and Margaret Snider from Days Creek; Irene Rodley and Kathryn Montgomery from the Looking Glass club; Neta Wells and Norma Byron from Olalla.

These young people are showing a great deal of interest and enthusiasm in doing excellent work, according to Homer Krell, club leader of Douglas county.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE ROSE STREET.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN:

That at a meeting of the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, held on the 21st day of June, 1922, the following resolution was adopted:

"RESOLVED, that the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, do hereby authorize and direct the City Engineer to improve Rose Street from the north line of Douglas Street to the north line of Court Street in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, in the following manner:

First: By grading the street to the proper sub-grade.

Second: By paving the roadway of said street twenty-five feet in width with concrete pavement.

Third: By constructing concrete curbs.

Fourth: By constructing sub-drains, if necessary.

Fifth: By constructing street monuments.

Sixth: By laying vitrified sewer pipe, if necessary.

Seventh: By constructing catch-basins and inlets.

Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and the grade, plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 21st day of June, 1922, which said grade, plans, specifications and estimates are hereby approved and adopted.

The entire cost of said improvement, including engineering, interest, and all other expenses which the City of Roseburg would not have incurred except for the making of said improvement, shall be assessed upon the property specially benefited thereby, as provided by the Charter of said City and in accordance with the petition of the property owners to be benefited by said improvement, and no part thereof shall be paid by the City of Roseburg.

The estimate of the City Engineer of the probable detailed cost of said improvement is the sum of \$251,244.

RESOLVED, that the City Recorder of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, be and he is hereby directed to give notice of said improvement as provided by the Charter of said City.

Remonstrances against said proposed improvement may be filed with the undersigned within twenty days from the first publication of this notice which is the 21st day of June, 1922.
