FARM NEWS

ORCHARD TILLAGE

(By County Agent B. W. Cooney) Every orchardist realizes the value of tillage in holding his soil moisture. On the other hand, but few realize what constitutes real tillage, or rather, the kind and amount of tillage that will conserve the maximum amount of soil moisture. There are a number of factors which have a fundamental bearing on the entire program. The first would, of course, be recognized as the soil itself. The kind of soil, the amount of organic matter it contains, the location as relating to under-drainage, and a number of other factors all lead to, or away from, the object we are trying to obtain—moisture conservation. Spades will not permit a lengthy discussion of how best to handle our many types of orchard soils, but rather, we hope to point out one or two outstanding principles that will in the main apply to a wide range of soils.

First, the average orchardist is not necessarily interested in just how the soil-water moves or the principal of capillary attraction, but he is vitally interested in maintaining as large an amount of moisture in his soil as possible. Now, it happens that the real thief of soil moisture is evaporation. There is only one practical way the orchardist has of holding this loss to minimum, and that is what is commonly known as the dust blanket. Remember, this is your only defense in holding soil moisture, and upon which your entire crop rests. We are not concerned in the implements you use, or how or when you use them, the result is what counts. Just what is meant by result?

I would say you have gotten them if you now have in your non-irrigated orchard a medium to fine three-inch dust-blanket. If you have this

condition, see to it that you keep it during the entire period cultivation. In a number of orchards the owners have not possessed themselves of this important dust-blanket. It may look nice to have the ground smooth, but you would find it after the roller or packer goes over it, but you are losing thousands of tons of water by evaporation. Don't fool yourself into the belief that you are holding moisture because you can find it one or two inches below the surface of the land. Your soil dries out from below first. If you doubt this, just take a spade or soil auger and dig a few holes in the orchard every ten days or so.

The entire program of dry farming rests upon the quality and depth of the dust-blanket. Now here is a program that you can bank upon. Get this three-inch dust-blanket; cultivate often enough to prevent the forming of a crust beneath it. Nature uses hundreds of pounds of water to make a pound of fruit. If you are after fruit, you know the answer.
