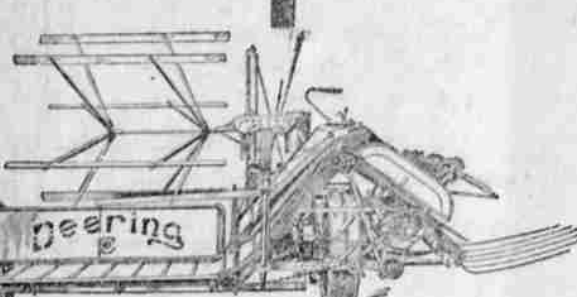

It was thought at first that Glendening was also dead, but he was rushed to St. Vincent's hospital and on to the operating table immediately. There the bullet was extracted from his lungs, but he probably will die.

For a long time Bohemian society in the city has been aroar with the gossip of the evident infatuation of the magazine editor with the beautiful Mrs. Adams. It is whispered that the affair had reached the point where the beauty had been named in the divorce petition of Glendening's wife, which was recently filed.

In Adams' pocket the police found a letter in which his wife had confessed to him her interest in Glendening and asked him to divorce her. The inference from this is that Glendening and the woman intended marrying as soon as both were divorced.

As this edition of the paper goes to press Glendening is still alive, but unconscious.

Chaire Adams, the American Beauty, has been the toast for the men about town for the last year. Although it was known she had a husband, no one ever saw him with her at the places she frequented. It was reported that Adams will sue the unwritten law as his defense.

That he did not intend to kill his wife has been the burden of Adams' plea to interviewers ever since the shooting.

Mrs. Glendening could not be found last night. Neither was anyone able to find Mr. George Davis, Glendening's attorney in her divorce case, or James Clavering, Glendening's lawyer.

Mrs. Glendening's petition for divorce is under consideration at present in Judge Tenney's court.

Glendening's mother and father were informed of their son's condition by telegram immediately after the shooting.

Davis and Clavering had stopped to read this entire news story under a street lamp. At its conclusion Clavering hastened away to the hospital to find out Glendening's condition. Davis returned to the club where both lived. By this time dawn was breaking.

As he entered, the hall man said: "Mr. Davis, Mrs. Glendening left word for you to phone her as soon as you came in."

Davis called the number and Doris Glendening answered. He told her he had seen the report and arranged to meet her as soon as he had bathed and breakfasted, and removed as best he could the ravages of a sleepless night.

RACE OF HIGH CIVILIZATION

Historic People of Mexico Evidently Highly Cultured and Advanced in the Arts.

Remarkable discoveries of the ruins of an ancient and heretofore unknown civilization have recently been made at Chalchihuites, state of Zacatecas, Mexico, according to information that has been received by the Mexican government authorities. While exploring the ruins that have long been known to exist at Chalchihuites the discovery of a magnificent room, or saloon, 1,000 feet square was made by J. V. Killee, archeologist of Andover, Mass., and Clarence Hay of the Museum of Natural History of the United States. In the saloon are 28 beautifully carved columns of stone. Many prehistoric relics were found while excavating the ruins, it is stated.

The statement is made on the authority of archeologists who have visited the ancient city at Chalchihuites and inspected the ruins brought to light by the recent excavations that they were the work of a civilization which had no connection with the prehistoric race that built the buildings and temples that are now in ruins at southern Mexico, nor are the ruins at Chalchihuites similar in any respect to those of San Juan Teotihuacan, where the pyramids of the moon and sun are found. Neither do they bear any resemblance to the ruins at Casas Grandes in the northern part of the country. It is said to be evident that the people who built the wonderful city where the little pueblo of Chalchihuites now stands were highly cultured and especially advanced in the arts.

BUILDERS GUIDED BY MODEL

Ingenious Method Employed in the Construction of Hydro-electric Plant in Switzerland.

In planning the mixing and chuting plant for the construction of the barrage de barberine, a hydro-electric development in Switzerland, it was found that many of the engineering difficulties would be solved through building an exact model of the site and then erecting the plant to scale. A contour map had fortunately been furnished the American firm, and with this as a guide the contour of the ground was reproduced in clay. Then the towers, guy lines, cables and chutes were all built to scale and placed in the exact positions that they were destined to occupy.

When this model was finished it helped wonderfully in solving the problems that had puzzled the draftsmen. The clearance required by a cableway, the location of the guy lines, the use of single or double guy lines, the bracing of the towers—these and many other points were made clear through the use of the accurate model. There was also the satisfaction of knowing that when the plant was finally installed the layout would be correct and the plant would function properly.—George E. Paul, in Scientific American.

This selection has raised a storm of protest from those who maintain that stainless steel would more fittingly have represented Sheffield's sentiments to the recipients, and at the same time expressed in an official manner the city's confidence in his latest product to win worldwide fame. The great demand for stainless steel has prevented the industrial slump from seriously crippling the cutlery industry of Sheffield.

Long-Lived Scottish Farmers.

The oldest farmer in West Scotland, Mr. John Gray, has just died, breaking an unusual record of longevity. Five farming brothers, all well over eighty, attended the funeral, which took place at Turbellon, Ayrshire, under the shadow of the inn in which Robert Burns was made a Freemason. Mr. Gray's death is the first in the family for over fifty years.

Goats Exceed Sheep.

The annual value of goat products in British Columbia now exceeds that of sheep, and goat raising is now looked upon as an important industry of the province. The milk yield during the past year increased 40 per cent over 1920, and still the supply is inadequate to meet the steady demand for this product.
