Alleged Auto Thief Arrested

Arthur Hanson, the original "Weary Willie," was placed in the county jail this afternoon on a charge of robbery. He will also be charged with stealing an automobile here last Sunday. Hanson was pulled off a train at Wilbur Sunday by Sheriff Starmer and S. P. Officer Stewart. He was told to go north, but instead, doubled back and came on into Roseburg. It is claimed that he then stole an automobile belonging to Harold Kincaid and drove it to Dillard where it was abandoned. They picked up a Mexican there and went on to Glendale. Hanson's clothes were about gone, so at Glendale he forcibly stripped the Mexican of everything but his B.V.D.'s, and even failed to leave his old clothes for the Mexican, who, after locating a barrel, woke up the chief of police and made his complaint. Hanson, after being arrested, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of robbery, and was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail. Up to this time the sheriff had not located the man responsible for the auto theft, although he knew who it was by the description furnished. When he met the train to escort the prisoner and his guard from the depot to the jail, he immediately recognized the transient as the one guilty of the auto theft. Hanson at first denied the charge, but later admitted his guilt to the officers. He will probably be held for the grand jury.

Lumbermen Oppose R. R. Dissolution

The Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association on June 22 declared itself as opposed to the dissolution of the Southern Pacific and Central Pacific railway lines. This organization includes the manufacturers of lumber at various points in western Oregon.

A resolution passed, reads as follows: "Resolved, that after a careful consideration of the subject in the opinion of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association whose membership is composed of shippers and manufacturers of lumber located in the Willamette valley in the State of Oregon, the disintegration of the Southern Pacific system and the separation from it of the lines of the Central Pacific railway would not be in the public interest, and such interest would be served best by the continued operation, for the future, of the Central Pacific Railway company's lines as an integral part of the Southern Pacific system. Resolved, further, that the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association approves of the suggestion of consolidation of the Southern Pacific and Central Pacific as the tentative plan of the Interstate Commerce commission and respectfully request that when hearings are held thereon, some of such hearings be held at points on the Pacific coast. Resolved, further, that in view of the uncertainty created by the decision of the supreme court in its recent decision respecting the merger of the Southern Pacific and Central Pacific systems and of the very great public importance of the subject to the Pacific coast and its producing and shipping interests, such hearings be held and the matter determined at an early date. Resolved, further, that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the

Supt. Explains Teachers' Ratings

EUGENE, June 28.—"I believe that the rating of teachers is one of the most important subjects that come before school men or women today," said Superintendent M. S. Hamm, of Roseburg, addressing the superintendents and principals at their annual conference on the university campus, June 21-23. "No rating scale can be wholly or in part successful unless teachers themselves have part in its conception. Teachers prefer to know upon what points they are being tested."

The "Roseburg Plan," as actually practiced in the schools of that city, was explained in detail. After stating that Roseburg retained or dismissed largely upon the ratings shown by this sheet, Superintendent Hamm summed it up in these words: "As it has worked out in Roseburg this year, it has proved a success."

Superintendent Hamm is at present taking work at the summer session of the University of Oregon, looking toward the degree of master of arts.
