Oregonian Motorists, generally speaking, have just two outstanding conditions which in any material way affect their tire mileage and service.

(1) On the Pavement

COURT BANS USE OF MARKET COIN ON STATE ROADS

EUGENE, June 27.—Enjoining the Lane county court from spending \$25,000 of market road money on the Pacific highway in the construction of a bridge north of Cottage Grove, a decision was handed down today by Circuit Judge Skipworth that is state-wide in scope in the case of S. M. Calkins against the county court. The decision not only affects \$25,000 budgeted in Lane county in the market road funds to be used in co-operation with the state on state roads, but it will disrupt the whole state road program as many county courts have gone on the theory that market money could be so expended.

Judge Skipworth declares that the state highways and market roads are two separate and distinct systems and "It was never the intention of the legislature that any part of the state highway should be constructed at the expense of the market road fund." He further declares that any resolution the county court may pass declaring the state highway a market road, as was done in Lane county, does not affect the status of the road.

Must Get Relief From Legislature. The fact that the state highway commission's and county court's "hands are tied" by the decision is "entirely beside the question. If the hands of these bodies are tied on account of the adverse decision they must look to the legislature for relief, and not to the courts," reads the order.

The case will be appealed at once to the supreme court, the defendants announce, to secure a final decision. The action to restrain the county court is regarded as a test case and the Judge Kelly decision recently in the Polk county case not on the broad general question.

OHIO RADIO FANS GET WARNING ABOUT WIRES

(International News Service.) TOLEDO, June 28.—Amateur radio fans have been warned by officials of the Ohio State Telephone company and Toledo Edison company against using their poles for the stringing of wires for their antennas.

Recent deaths in other cities resulting from wires coming in contact with charged wires have resulted in officials of both companies instructing linemen to remove all antennas found attached to telephone poles. "We are not trying to discourage the radio fans," said Fred Derge, of the Edison company, "but we want to protect them from some of the high tension wires of which they have no knowledge."

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE HOW STREET.

That at a meeting of the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, held on the 19th day of June, 1922, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, do hereby propose to improve and hereby propose to improve How Street from the west line of Winchester Street to the east line of the Oregon and California Railroad Company Right of Way, in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, in the following manner:

First: By grading the street to the proper sub-grade.

Second: By paving the roadway of said street twenty feet in width with concrete pavement.

Third: By constructing sub-drains, if necessary.

Fourth: By constructing street monuments.

Fifth: By having vitrified sewer pipe, if necessary.

Sixth: By constructing catch-basins, and inlets.

Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and the grade, plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 13th day of June, 1922, which said grade, plans, specifications and estimates are hereby approved and adopted.

One-half of the paying costs of said improvement shall be assessed upon the property especially benefited thereby, as provided by the Charter of said City, and in accordance with the position of the property owners to be ascertained by said improvement, and the remainder of said costs shall be paid by the City of Roseburg.

That estimate of the City Engineer of the probable detailed cost of said improvement is the sum of \$2023.58.

RESOLVED, That the City Recorder of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, be and he is hereby directed to give notice of said proposed improvement as provided by the Charter of said City.

Improvements against said proposed improvement may be filed with the undersigned within thirty days from the date of the filing of this notice which is the 21st day of June, 1922.

HARDING LAUDED FOR FINE WORK

WASHINGTON, June 26.—Measures instituted by the Harding administration and congress have hastened post-war readjustment brought prosperity within reach, retired \$900,000,000 of the national debt, reduced government expenses 25 per cent and reduced taxes \$1,000,000,000 a year Senator McCormick, Illinois chairman of the republican general campaign, said today in referring to the economic situation.

"America is an oasis of prosperity in the world," said the senator. "The triumph of general activity and general employment, the restoration of prosperity can be prevented only by continued procrastination and delay in the debate the tariff, or by general strikes."

"Americans are realizing now as they have not before the great measure in which congress and the administration have contributed to the recovery of business and agriculture, and to the sharp reduction in unemployment. The country has hardly understood the magnitude of the achievement before congress and the administration."
