Cannery Meeting To Be Held Soon

Electric Fire Siren Installed

The work of installing the new electric fire siren recently purchased by the city, was completed today. The siren has been installed on top of the city hall and in tests worked perfectly. It is controlled from two points and has an automatic device which controls the fluctuations of the current, giving the siren effect. After today it will be used as a fire alarm and will be sounded whenever the fire truck is to be taken out. The steam siren at the roundhouse will probably be retained and will be used for a general alarm signal in case of a serious conflagration.

Miss Margaret Bille Conducts Junior Chautauqua.

PAGEANT SATURDAY

Many Instructive Games and Different National Folk Dances Are Taught to Roseburg Children.

The playground work and Junior Chautauqua department of the Ellison-White Chautauqua is progressing with enthusiasm this year under the leadership of Miss Margaret Bille. Miss Bille is a graduate of the University of Washington in Seattle and during her four years in college she worked with the Chautauqua and playground work in mind she had acquired experience in the Collins Field practice house in Seattle and in playgrounds of the Tacoma park. Miss Bille's home town is in Tacoma, Washington. It was only last March that she finished her course in the social service work in the physical education department of the U. of W. She is a member of the Pi Lambda Theta Sorority which is a woman's educational sorority, and she is an active worker in the Young Woman's Christian Association.

A large crowd of kiddies attend the Junior Chautauqua, which is held in the Chautauqua tent from 2 until 11, and their work has been made very interesting by Miss Bille. They have organized what they call a "Junior Town" and the following officers have been elected: Mayor, Bill Knight; town clerk, Shirley Knight; Chief of police, Maynard Bell; health and service commissioner, Ruth Comp-ton. Each morning the first thing on their program is the town meeting and the reports of the officers. They are then instructed in different games and folk dances, and spend some time in practice of their pageant. Those who are assisting with instructions in the pageant are: Audrey White, Adella Armstrong and Gladys White. Nevada Church is assisting in the playground work.

The pageant this year will be "Conquest of Peace" and it will show many of the peace makers of the United States history in costume. This pageant will be given Saturday afternoon after a prelude given by the Givens Company. It will show the willingness of peace above war and will be a good lesson to the kiddies who take part as well as those who witness the performance. It will be given in eight episodes, the first seven showing the peace workers and the last will show folk dances and songs representing the different countries and will be concluded by the Star Spangled Banner.

BROKEN PLANE LANDS HERE

Captain L. H. Smith Forced Down By Broken Cam Shaft

FIELD NEEDS MARKER

Famous Flyer is on Long Trip for Purpose of Charting and Photographing Landing Fields in Western States.

Captain Lowell H. Smith, for the last three years at the head of the forest air patrol in this state, arrived in Roseburg last night by airplane, being forced down by a broken camshaft. Captain Smith and his mechanic, Sergeant William B. Whitefall, have been making an 8,000-mile trip photographing landing fields for a book which the government is preparing. They were flying from Eugene to San Francisco, when the cam shaft was broken and they were forced from their route about 25 miles east into Roseburg, where they made a landing safely.

Captain Smith states that he greatly regrets that Roseburg is taking no interest in a landing field. It is a field which can be duplicated in but very few places, he says. There is practically no city that has such a good natural field, and none so close in without having to buy expensive, cultivated property. There is not even a marker on the field at present, and in case a flier should be forced to land here, he would be in difficulties unless he knew the field. Captain Smith has been here on a number of occasions before, and had little difficulty in making a safe landing with his large De Havilland plane.

He and Sergeant Whitefall have traversed the states of Montana, Idaho, Nevada, Utah, Oregon, and Washington, making a total of more than 6,000 air miles.

They telegraphed immediately for repairs, and a plane is expected to arrive late this evening from San Francisco bearing repair parts. The broken part will be replaced at once and the planes will take the air again tomorrow and go on to San Francisco.

Roseburg will not be included in the air chart which the government is putting out. Other fields have been photographed and described in a manner that will give those cities good advertising. Roseburg, however, is off the air map, and no mention will be made. In fact, the route for planes will be 25 or more miles east, and Roseburg will be used only for emergency landings.
