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STRIKE CALLED FOR 10 A. M. JULY 1st

DARD ATTEMPTS TO BLOCK STRIKE

Meeting Called for Tomorrow Morning—Union Heads Are Summoned.

ORDER IS SENT OUT

Ordered to Walk Out on Morning of July 1st—Scores of Shopmen Quit Jobs Today—R. R. Officials Are Unconcerned.

(By Associated Press.)

CHICAGO, June 29.—Strike orders issued by the six craft presidents of the railroad shopmen's organizations went out today to the general public, representing 40,000 men, declaring a strike at 10 a. m. July 1st on all of the railroads and Pullman shops in the United States.

The United States railroad labor board today cited the national officers of the six shop craft unions, the railroad executives now meeting here and the officers of four other railroad unions to appear before the board tomorrow afternoon for an inquiry into the threatened interruption of traffic.

Trainmen Continue Work.

CLEVELAND, June 29.—The engineers and trainmen will continue their work but will not take the places of the work of any railway employee on strike in connection with the men of the shop crafts, the brotherhood chiefs announced today.

Settlement Is In Sight.

CHICAGO, June 29.—Settlement of the threatened coal strike was in prospect today with the officials in high circles believing that the strike would not materialize. After conferring with the rail and union heads the railroad labor board held a conference Friday, when it was expected a compromise to block the strike would not be difficult to attain. Should the railroads insist on the board to abide by its decision forbidding the letting out of rail work on contract, the union heads believed a walkout would be either called off or delayed. The union heads insisted that a large majority of the employees voted for the strike but the railroads plan to let out construction and repair work on contract. Scores of shop and maintenance of way employees walked out this morning but this is taken as no indication of a general move towards a strike.

Say Demands Impossible.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Invitations went out from the White House today asking the leaders of the strike men and the representatives of the employing coal operators in both bituminous and anthracite fields of the United States to meet President Harding Saturday "to devise methods in which negotiations for the settlement of the coal strike can be initiated."

The communication made evident a careful and competent discussion with spokesmen on both sides of the industrial struggle had preceded the meeting call, and prompt and ready acceptance are expected immediately.

John L. Lewis, chief of the United Mine Workers, who remained in the city after a personal interview with the president, accepted at once in behalf of the union.

Ways and Means Discussed.

The wording of the president's message was interpreted as demonstrating the desire of the administration to hold the meeting above the controversies which have bedeviled the industrial section of the country since 1911. Official, but informal comment emphasized it was the intention of the conference should be held to discuss ways and means for settlement and not to take up the demands for continuance of the time wage scales, nor the operators' demand in the bituminous field for separate district wage agreements, nor the semi-national wage contracts that have heretofore been

THREE CELEBRATIONS TO BE HELD IN COUNTY ON THE FOURTH OF JULY

Reedsport, Canyonville and Sutherlin Have Arranged for Celebrations on Independence Day—Good Programs Have Been Arranged by Each Community.

The Fourth of July is to be well observed in Douglas county with three large celebrations planned. Canyonville, Sutherlin and Reedsport have each arranged big celebrations and the great majority of people will attend one or another of these.

It has always been a sort of mutual agreement in Douglas county that Roseburg was to have the strawberry carnival which should be supported by the smaller towns, and that Roseburg would not celebrate the Fourth. This year, as Roseburg did not have the carnival, there was some talk of a Fourth of July celebration, but this plan did not materialize, and Roseburg is not celebrating the Fourth of July this year.

Reedsport is arranging for a "real" time. This celebration has been advertised very heavily, and will draw from Coos and Lane counties, as well as from Douglas county. The Roseburg baseball team is to meet the Reedsport team in the afternoon for the main ball game. It had been expected that the Douglas County Concert band would be able to go, but this will be impossible.

A parade will be held in the morning, and will go from Reedsport to Wade's flat, where the ceremonies of the day are to be held. There will be a patriotic program, followed by a barbecue. In the afternoon, there will be a ball game, races, and water sports. Log-rolling, swimming and diving contests, motorboat races, aeroplane exhibitions, etc., will provide entertainment for several hours. There will be a big dance in the evening.

The Reedsport people have promised to have a sufficient number of boats at Scottsburg to transport all the Roseburg people who desire to attend the celebration, to Reedsport. By leaving here at 5 or 6 o'clock in the morning, it is possible to reach Reedsport by noon. If the trip to Scottsburg is made on Monday evening, Reedsport can be reached by boat early enough Tuesday morning to take in all of the festivities.

This will be a fine opportunity for Roseburg people to make an excursion to the lower Umpqua. There are a number of beautiful side trips to Winchester bay, Gardiner, Smith river, and other points, if a person desires to take them.

All who intend going to Reedsport are asked to communicate with Attorney Guy Gordon before Saturday and he will inform the Reedsport committee, so that sufficient boats may be provided for the trip from Scottsburg to Reedsport.

Canyonville's celebration is to be one of the best given in southern Oregon in a number of years. There will be a big parade at 10 o'clock, followed by a patriotic program which will take up the time until noon, when a big picnic dinner will be served. In the afternoon there will be a ball game and a number of

"Hands Off" Is Policy.

CHICAGO, June 29.—(U. P.)—The railroad labor board must handle the differences with the unions over wages and working conditions which threaten a strike, the railroad executives told the unions today. The railroads will assume a "hands off" policy, as they do not believe they are directly involved in the disagreement, C. DeWitt Cuylock, head of the association of railroad executives said this afternoon.

There will be frequent band concerts and a dance in the evening. Sutherlin's celebration is to be somewhat similar. At 3:30 there will be a ball game between the Sutherlin and the Yoncalla baseball teams, together with sports and races. In the evening there will be a band concert, followed by a boxing exhibition at 8 o'clock. At 9:30 Lieutenant Ayres will give an aerial exhibition with an illuminated plane. There will be dancing in the pavilion all day.

In addition to these three major celebrations, several communities are planning on lesser celebrations, and will hold community picnics, ball games, sports, etc.

PRIVY COUNCIL RATIFIES TREATY

TOKIO, June 29.—The privy council approved the naval treaty adopted at the Washington arms conference and submitted it today to Prince Regent for ratification. The committee found the ratio of ships apportioned to Japan disadvantageous to the empire, but from the spirit of respect for the Washington conference and the desire to maintain world peace they recommended ratification.

KIDNAPPERS LEAVE BUT WILL RETURN

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Mexican rebels who seized 40 Americans and the property of the Cortez Oil company in the Tampico region Sunday, holding them for fifteen thousand pesos ransom, withdrew Monday but threatened to return, according to a consular report today.

NEW KIDNAPPINGS BEEN REPORTED

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Mexican bandits under General Coronado seized the Pecora camp of the La Porona Oil company today, holding 55 Americans under guard.

Consul Shaw at Tampico advised the state department of the affair this morning. The forty Americans held at the Cortez company camp have been released and that camp abandoned, according to Shaw's message.

National Guard on Way Home

The Roseburg National Guard company which has been receiving training at Camp Lewis, is due home tomorrow morning. The company reached Portland this morning and passed state and federal inspection there this afternoon. They will entrain this evening for the home trip and should reach here at an early hour. According to letters received from the boys while at camp they have had a fine time and have profited by their experiences. They have greatly enjoyed their trip from the vacation standpoint, being allowed a great deal of camp liberty.

OFFENSIVE TAKEN BY IRISH REBELS

Fierce Fighting in Streets of Dublin Occurs This Afternoon.

NINETEEN ARE KILLED

Banks and Business Houses Closing. Newspapers Suspend Publication on Account of Terrible Civil War Raging in City.

DUBLIN, June 29.—The Irish rebels took the offensive this afternoon in a battle with the Free Staters. Armed I. W. S. aided the rebels to seize strategic buildings on Dublin street corners. The fighting at the four courts continued. Street battles are raging at several points. The British troops are protecting the banks to prevent looting. Several were killed in home street fighting. Warfare broke out in Parnell Square, one of the important squares in Dublin.

Hundreds of insurgents answered Rory O'Connor's call and mobilized for battle with the Free Staters. O'Connor was still besieged in the four courts. Communication with southern Ireland was cut off this evening when all of the telephone and telegraph wires were cut.

Barracks Captured.

BELFAST, June 29.—The Free State troops stormed and captured Drogheda barracks in County Louth, 25 miles north of Dublin, today, according to reports here.

Fights in South Ireland.

CORK, June 29.—Fighting between the Free Staters and the insurgents spread through southern Ireland today. Skirmishes were reported from scores of the smaller towns.

Battle Around Bank.
DUBLIN, June 29.—Fighting extended around the Bank of Ireland today. Two rebels and two civilians were killed. The rebels poured a stream of fire into the bank building from nearby roofs, but the Free Staters in the bank's interior beat off the attack.

The rebels were growing bolder and appeared to be carrying the fight more offensively against the Collins forces.

Fighting More Fierce.

LONDON, June 29.—Fighting in the streets of Dublin is increasing, says a Central News dispatch at 6 o'clock this afternoon.

The irregulars on the outskirts besieged the four courts district, receiving reinforcements. Three civilians were killed in today's fighting, bringing the total to 19.

Business houses as well as banks are closing. Newspapers suspended publication. The irregulars occupied offices in the Evening Herald for a time today.

OBREGON SAYS REPORTS FALSE

MINE DISORDERS OCCUR IN DENVER

DENVER, June 29.—Two mine tips were burned and one coal mine flooded and two railroad bridges burned in the Colorado coal fields in Boulder and Huerfano counties last night. The state rangers are being mobilized here in case of possible disorders in the Colorado coal fields following the burning of the two railroad bridges. State officials said that the strike sympathizers were to blame for the fires.

M'CUMBER RUNS AHEAD OF FRAZIER

FARGO, N. D., June 29.—Returns from 403 precincts out of 2064 for the republican senatorial nomination gave McCumber 27,815, Frazier, 19,802, and McHarg, 1,664. Earlier returns had given McCumber a lead of two to one. Defeat Is Indicated.

Forestry Officers in City Today

R. H. Chappier of the U. S. Forestry Service, and Porter S. King of the state forestry office, were in Roseburg today on official duties. They are arranging cooperation between the state and federal agencies for the protection of the O. and C. grant lands which are under the jurisdiction of the department of the interior. The protection of these lands is divided between the state agency and the U. S. forestry service and Mr. Chappier is in charge of this work for the government, while Mr. King represents the state.

Roseburg Field Will Be Listed

The statement that the Roseburg aviation field has not been charted is an error, according to Captain Lowell H. Smith, who is charting all landing fields in the western states. The Roseburg field was photographed last year by Col. Arnold and Captain Smith, he stated, and will be listed with others in the new book which the government is preparing. Roseburg people should see that a marker is placed there and that the field is kept in fair condition. At the present time it is in fairly good shape, he says, and can be used for emergencies, but should be plainly marked so that aviators who are unfamiliar with the territory may be able to locate the field and land safely.

WORLD FAMOUS LECTURER OPIE READ SPEAKS ON HUMAN NATURE AT CHAUTAUQUA

Kindly Philosopher Holds Audience Spellbound While He Holds Before Them Pictures Taken from the Book of Life—Girl Musicians Give Delightful Prelude.

"It is the thinking minority, not the shouting majority that causes advancement."
"College is the cradle and not the birthplace of true genius."
"No man was ever truly great if he did only what was expected of him."

advancing the individual rather than a leveling of all masses, was made last night at Chautauqua by the world-famous lecturer, Opie Read. Advancement depends upon individuality, the kindly philosopher stated, and the nation cannot but suffer when all people are reduced to a common level with common thought and expression. Difference of opinion stimulates thought and thought is the power upon the wheel of life. Opie Read's lecture upon "Human Nature and Politics" was one of the high spots of the Chautauqua program. From the book of life he took page after page and sold it before the gaze of the public, showing picture after picture from human nature. As he spoke the audience was carried from hilarious laughter to the depths of pathos, tragedy and suspense. The speaker was given the closest attention as he held the audience spellbound by his kindly exposure of human nature, displaying its faults, its failings, its weaknesses, its strengths, its sympathy and its tenderness.
"President Harding is kindly, sympathetic and sane," said the speaker as he opened his address with a story of Harding's sympathy as he helped a tired, road-weary man in the far northern countries.
"What I have to say," he told the audience, is what has floated to the surface through observation and experience, and I invite you to go with me on a rambling walk through the fields of human nature."
Mr. Read went on with a plea for individual expression. History has proven that the masses are often wrong. It was an individual that was crucified and it was the majority that shouted "crucify him." It was the majority that believed the world to be flat and it was Columbus who proved them to be mistaken. It was the majority that favored slavery, and it was Lincoln that proved them to be wrong. The majority believed in witchcraft and in many other cases it has been the majority that has clung to the old paths until an individual blazed a new trail for them. In all ages it has been the thinkers who have caused advancement.
Every man, no matter how ignorant, is ready to give advice on human nature and politics, Mr. Read said. Statesmen are limited.
The efforts of Americans to reduce everything to a common level has taken away the outstanding figures as they have existed in years past, and a 1-armed man could count the outstanding statesmen in America on
