FOREIGN-BORN INCREASE

WASHINGTON, D. C. June 28.—The total white population of the country, foreign born or with one or both parents foreign born on January 1, 1920, was 36,398,955, the department of commerce announced today in a compilation of the 1920 census figures. This was an increase in the "foreign white stock" of the nation's population from 1910 of 4,155,576, or +12.9 per cent.

This 1920 total includes, it was shown, 13,713,754 immigrants and 22,685,204 persons born in this country, one or both of whose parents were immigrants.

his fingers. Every bob-tailed dog in congress or legislature thinks it is his bounden duty to pass a law no matter whether it be good or bad, until we have become the most law-ridden nation on the earth. The people are to blame that better men are not elected to public office. The politician can be as honest as he wants to be, and flattery is his chief asset. The politicians often lead us to the polls with pink ribbons and win success by cleverly disguised flattery.

The lecturer proceeded to draw pictures after pictures from the encyclopedia of experience. Human nature as it is revealed itself upon the gallow, as the life of the underworld reached the highest pinnacle of Christianity, as the worst of men and women proved to the world that human nature never sinks below the level of spiritual redemption. At times the audience was in tears; again held breathless as gaunt tragedy and death stalked before the blind's eye, then swung to the lofty pinnacles of inspiration, only to be convulsed by droll humor.

Human nature was dissected and held up for inspection, but through it all ran the kindly and sympathetic tone always showing that the good in human nature is the overpowering factor, and that it cannot be surpassed—that human nature is "never totally depraved."

In closing, Mr. Read paid a high tribute to the great Americans of the past. Abraham Lincoln was held before the audience as a man whose great sympathy was a model and pattern for all mankind. He pleaded that the people of this country should turn back to the lives of these great statesmen and from their experiences draw knowledge for the future. A poetic and inspirational tribute to our country and its flag closed the address which is beyond all question a masterpiece of the lecture platform.

The lecture was preceded by a very pleasing prelude by the Oceanic quintet. These five young ladies played a wide variety of instruments and gave a program of orchestra music, solo numbers, vocal selections and pianologues. They were well received and the audience was reluctant to have them go.

This afternoon a musical program was given by the Watteau girls, and this evening the feature will be the well-known play, "Cappy Ricks."

Boxing Card For Sutherlin on 4th

Sutherlin is arranging for one of the best boxing cards to be presented in this part of the state. Natron Cut-off to Be Completed

PORTLAND, June 29.—The Natron cut-off will be completed and lines will be extended through central Oregon if the Union Pacific gains ultimate control of the Central Pacific as a result of the decision recently granted by the United States supreme court, according to telegraphic information received here yesterday by Arthur C. Spencer, local attorney for the Union Pacific.

The telegram came after the Klamath county chamber of commerce had requested Carl S. Gray, president, to state what his company would do for central and southern Oregon providing the Union Pacific gains from the Southern Pacific control of the Central Pacific.

"It must be manifest that an independent Central Pacific cannot operate in Oregon territory without completion of the so-called Natron cut-off, and the Union Pacific system, as a matter of course, if it ultimately secured the Central Pacific, including its Oregon lines, would complete this line," said the telegram in part.

Mr. Spencer commented upon Mr. Gray's message as follows:

"The entry of the Union Pacific into the Willamette valley and western Oregon would afford transportation service from this section to the heart of commercial activity of the country by the shortest and most direct route possible. It is inconceivable that the Union Pacific would desire to enter this western Oregon section if it did not conceive resulting development and the advantage to both the country and the railroad."

DIVIDEND IS AUTHORIZED

SALEM, June 28.—A dividend of 5 per cent was authorized in favor of depositors of the defunct Bank of Jacksonville today, according to announcement made at the offices of Frank Bramwell, state banking superintendent. The bank was closed by order of the state banking department in August, 1920. Approximately \$250,000 of depositors' claims have been approved and the dividend aggregates \$12,000.

Mr. Bramwell said he did not believe the total dividends to be authorized would exceed 10 per cent.
