KILLED IN SELF DEFENSE IS CLAIM

OREGON CITY, June 30.—Russell Hecker, accused of first degree murder of Frank Bowker, Portland musician, was on the stand today. He testified that he killed Bowker in self defense after the latter had fired at him during the climax of a bootlegger's quarrel.

OREGON CITY, June 30.—(Associated Press.)—Russell Hecker on the stand in his own defense today admitted that he killed Frank Bowker in a quarrel which Bowker refused to fail in with Bowker's plan to hold up a man from whom they were to purchase fifteen cases of whiskey. Testifying that Bowker declared Hecker was double-crossing him and lunged at him the youthful defendant added: "He was a bigger man than I am and I grabbed my gun and shot." Hecker added that Bowker also fired shots.

HOUSE FAVORS FORD PLAN

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Action by congress in appropriating \$7,500,000 for work on the dam means that "the completion of the Muscle Shoals development is now a certainty," Representative Almon, Alabama, in whose district the nitrate plant is located, declared today in a statement.

Mr. Almon predicted that Henry Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals would be "accepted by the house by a big majority when it reconvenes in August."

"Members of the house will have an opportunity during the recess to study the Ford offer and ascertain the sentiment of their constituents on the subject," said Mr. Almon, "and as a result the pro-Ford sentiment will be so strong that the lead-

ers in the house will be glad to give us a vote on the Ford offer, which will result in an overwhelming majority in favor of its acceptance."

New York, June 29.—(By Associated Press.)—The bulk of the estate left by William Rockefeller, oil magnate reputed to have been one of the richest men in the world was bequeathed to his four children under the terms of his will filed for probate late today.

Virtually the entire estate, the value of which was cloaked in the legal phrase, "over \$10,000," was left to the immediate family, with no charitable bequests.

After certain deductions, Mr. Rockefeller, who died recently at his home in North Tarrytown, directed that his estate should be divided into four parts and given his children, Percy, and William G. Rockefeller, Mrs. Geraldine Dodge and Mrs. Emma McAlpin.
