"CAPPY RICKS" IS EXCELLENT PLAY

Interesting Story Is Improved
by Presentation on Chau-
taqua Platform.

PARTS ARE WELL TAKEN

Good Attendance at Both Programs
Yesterday With the Tent Filled
to Capacity and Even Stand-
ing Room Taken at Night.

"Cappy Ricks," a play full of humor and with a unique plot, was presented at Chautauqua last night. This play, which was taken from the story by the same name, which recently appeared in the Saturday Evening Post, is one which keeps the audience amused and entertained until the last curtain. All of the actors presented last night were excellent in their parts, the characters of Cappy Ricks, the old sea captain, and head of the Blue Star shipping company, and Skinner, his secretary, being exceptionally well displayed. All of the other actors took their parts well, with a stage presence which made the audience forget the settings and other difficulties with which the actors were handicapped, and lose themselves completely in the rollicking comedy which was brought before them. "Cappy Ricks" is a story which will live long in the minds of the American people. Its plot is one which cannot be easily forgotten, and it will bear frequent repetition. It has been produced in story form as well as on the screen and stage, and in each case lost none of its charm. The presentation of the play here will be remembered as one of the high spots of this year's program.

In the afternoon a concert was given by the Watteau girls. These two young ladies proved to be versatile entertainers who gave a very pleasing afternoon.

The attendance at both programs yesterday was exceptionally good. Tomorrow's program will be given by the Gilvan Opera company, with the Junior Chautauqua pageant and playground festival at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, a short prelude by the opera company being given first.

so-called "scabs" they will join the strike when it occurs.

Meeting Tonight
A meeting of the locals will be held tonight at which time definite arrangements and plans will be made. Headquarters will be established and an organization perfected. A federated committee has been appointed and the situation has been placed in their hands. This committee will take all action necessary to carry on the strike.

Men Are Ready.
"We are 100 per cent strong," said a member of the local committee this morning. "There is not a man among us that really wants a strike. We do not want to quit our work and have to fight for our rights, but if we must do that then there is not a man here who will shrink from his duty. If it becomes necessary to strike every man will quit and will remain out until we win. When the labor board has taken away conditions which we have had for the past forty years and which were gained by hard work on the part of our unions and our organizations, and when this same board has refused to allow humanity to enter into their dealings and decisions we are forced to take a firm stand to accomplish justice."

Will Be No Violence.
"We want to impress upon all railroad men the necessity of keeping away from violence. We are peaceable, law abiding men and we do not intend in any way to indulge in violence or disorder. We ask the public to be fair minded and to investigate all charges made against us. We cannot tolerate such propaganda as has been put out against the working men. We have not the capital to gain control of mediums dispersing information to the public. We can anticipate that there will be many statements made attempting to influence the public against our cause but we are open and anxious for investigation and ready to account for any and all of our actions. It is possible that there may be those who will take advantage of this occasion to indulge in certain kinds of disorder, but the public may be assured that these persons are not connected with us and have no sanction for any such actions. We urge all railroad men to be on the lookout for violence and disorder and to endeavor to prevent anyone from doing anything which may

cast reflection upon our organization.

Parley Is Useless.
"The time has come, apparently, when action is necessary. The more we argue and put it off, the less we get. We have spent years of time and thousands upon thousands of dollars in an effort to show the labor board where we were right. We have investigated to obtain data to lay before them. We have employed the best of counsel and have done all we could reasonably do to maintain our position which we know to be right, but the labor board has cast humanity to one side, have blinded themselves to justice and have arrayed themselves upon the side of greedy capital. We have nothing left to do but take a firm stand to maintain our rights. We have spent years in useless argument and parley. We have gained nothing and, in fact, have lost ground."

Salaries Are Low.
"The average salary of the maintenance of way worker is between \$550 and \$800 per year. Any thinking person realizes that with the present living standards and the high prices of all commodities that a man cannot keep his family even in bare necessities on this salary, and now the labor board proposes another cut. In the name of humanity the workers must protest the action which will take the very bread from the mouths of their children."

"We brought these conditions before the labor board. Women and their children, with scarce clothes enough to cover themselves, appeared before the board to appeal for better conditions but to no avail and now we are to receive still further wage reductions which will make conditions intolerable. We hope that we will not have to strike. We hope that the orders are countermanded and the labor board will change its decision, but if we must strike then we will do it with a will to win and will sacrifice our positions rather than allow such rulings as have been made against us to go into effect."

Orders Are Posted.
Orders calling for a strike at 1 o'clock tomorrow morning have been posted on the bulletin board at the local roundhouse and all workers coming under the jurisdiction of the order have received their instructions. The general foreman will be the only man left, all others being required to walk out. What action the other branches of railway workers will take has not been announced. The Big Four unions of the trainmen have announced that they do not expect to strike, but they may refuse to handle the engines and cars prepared by the strikebreakers which will be a strong factor in favor of the shophmen. On the other hand they may take no action whatever although they have plainly announced that they will take no hand in the preparation of trains and engines.

The strike if called will seriously affect local conditions, at least for a time, and the general public is certainly with the railroad workers in hoping that the strike may be prevented.

CREDITORS GET DIVIDEND

SALEM, Ore., June 28.—The first dividend to creditors of the Bank of Jacksonville to be declared since the failure of the bank, August 10, 1920, has been declared at five per cent, by the state banking department, and the checks will be mailed to about 400 creditors on July 1. The total dividend will be about \$12,000.

As a result of the failure and the subsequent investigation, W. H.

Johnson, of Jacksonville, president of the bank, is serving a 10-year sentence in the state penitentiary, and R. D. Hines, vice-president, is on parole under a three-year sentence. Both were convicted on charges of making false reports.

There is no desire to remove all joy from the occasion, but it is held that instead of promiscuous noise and illumination, with attendant casualties, the occasion should be made a patriotic, community affair, with appropriate exercises.
