By the time "Lefty" returned to Catonsville, with his arms in splints—but still smiling—he and the golfers had become fast friends.

CALIFORNIA DOCTOR PAYS HIGH TRIBUTE TO MELODY OF BIRD

LONDON, July 3.—Not even the most petted and pampered prima donna has ever had so great a compliment paid her voice as the composer which Dr. Casey Wood, of California, has just paid to the common British nightingale. The doctor, who just completed a 5,000-mile trip in order that he might hear the bird sing in full song.

The quest must have cost thousands of dollars. It has meant much discomfort, traveling night and day, sea, air and road, but at the end, after pneumonia by kneeling on a damp, dewy grass, he has fulfilled his long-postponed wish.

Far away in the fastnesses of a grey woodland the doctor heard a metallic "tweet-tweet" of the nightingale. He must have been disappointed for the nightingale has a harsh note at times and often the distracted inhabitants of the city country houses here to shy away at the disturber of the night rather than listen reverently to it on its knees, as did Dr. Wood.

It is now dangerous to whisper the bird's name in the ear of Dr. Casey Wood. It is true he came all the way to hear the songster, but he utterly regrets ever spilling to the porters the cause of his long journey. Since that date he has been besieged by well-meaning

pers who wanted to track their particular nightingales for his benefit. Bird lovers from all corners of the continent have been pestering him. They even inquired at the house for him, and it was all too overpowering for him, so he had to move about incognito.

To the International News Service the doctor gave his impressions of the nightingale.

"The result was highly successful," he said. "Toward noon of a bright sunny day the first nightingale was encountered. His deep, sweet song was distinctly heard at intervals for over an hour. This concentrated the faculty of the ear at such a point that the bird only sings at night or in the gloaming."

"During the tramp over the beau-

tiful downs in Surrey a dozen birds of the species were heard in full or partial song until hunger and the shades of night drove the explorer to rest."

MURDER INTENT CHARGED

OMAHA, Neb., June 30.—A charge of assault with intent to commit murder has been filed against Fred Brown, Benson "chain man."

Brown is charged with having assaulted H. E. Boyd, whom he is alleged to have held up at the point of a revolver and made a chained prisoner at his shack in Benson, a suburb, May 17, when Boyd attempted to rescue two women who were being held captive there.

Brown is to be brought here from Lincoln next week. He is reported nearly recovered from the effects of a bullet wound that resulted in his capture by a Wyoming posse north of Medicine Bow two weeks ago.

HOUSE TAKES A VACATION

WASHINGTON, June 30.—The house of representatives adjourned tonight at 9:40 o'clock until August 15, thus giving members an opportunity to return home to look after the campaigns while the senate still is at work on the tariff.

Democrats, opposing adjournment almost solidly, forced a roll call. The vote to quit was 171 to 43, with two voting "present."

"The democrats having voted with their fingers crossed, I now move that the house be adjourned," said Representative Mondell, the Republican leader. There was a shout and a wild race to taxicabs waiting outside to rush members to outgoing trains.

In opposing adjournment, Democrats insisted the house ought to stay in session and act on Henry Ford's offer for lease of Muscle Shoals.

DIFFER AS TO GIANT RAY

Naturalists Divided in Opinion Concerning Structural Makeup of Monster Fish.

The great devilfish or giant ray, which abounds in the waters around Beaufort, S. C., and Captiva Inlet, Fla., has occasionally been found off New York and New Jersey. The furthest north it has ever been taken is Block Island, where one was caught last year.

This was 14 feet wide between the tips of the pectoral fins, 7 feet long from head to base of tail, and weighed 1,686 pounds. This is the only specimen known to have been weighed, but there are stories of fish that are said to have weighed 10,000 pounds.

Dr. E. W. Gudger of the American Museum of Natural History writes of the giant ray in Science, and says that naturalists who have described it differ as to whether it has a large spine or sting on its tail. The one caught at Block Island had none, but there was a wound on the tail where a spine was said to have been torn off. The late Theodore Gill, dean of American ichthyologists, doubted the spine, as have other writers, although some naturalists picture it with one.

His Affliction.—A new disease has been discovered—at least so one of the workers of the Pittsburgh chapter of the American Red Cross reports. It developed the other day when a veteran called for aid.

An effort is being made to ascertain the nature of this new ailment.—Medical Record.

Smashes Egg Laying Record.

An Ancon hen, recently owned by Nels Pierson, who lives in the Mascotte section, has smashed the world's record for egg production in one year by laying 339 eggs. Mr. Pierson had another hen of the same breed which laid 335 eggs during the year 1921. The chickens were purchased from a poultry breeder at Berea, O., and when the breeder learned of the remarkable record of the two birds he came all the way from his Ohio home, purchased them and took them back north for exhibition purposes.—Eustis Lake (Fla.) Region.

Denver Girl Tells Dope Ring Secrets

DENVER, July 3.—A lurid tale of how she was kidnapped by members of a "dope peddling ring," taken to a squalid shack on the outskirts of Denver, starved into submission and assaulted, was related to juvenile court officials here today by a 17 year old Denver school girl, whose name is being withheld.

The girl declared that the "dope ring" gang abducts and holds captive young girls, giving them morphine and cocaine in an effort to "create" a new market for their illicit traffic and frequently force their captives onto the street in a life of shame.

Juvenile court and welfare officers have investigated the story and verified many details, including the discovery of the shack in which the girl claims to have been held a prisoner for six weeks, as well as other "dens" in isolated sections of the city.

That the shack in which the unidentified girl was mistreated was the headquarters of a "school" to force the use of drugs upon young girls is the belief expressed by welfare officers, and police are investigating the activities of the gang in search for clues to the disappearance of and assaults upon numerous young Denver girls in recent weeks.

Shack Is Located.

Juvenile court attaches found the shack in which the girl was held captive in a grove of trees just outside the city limits—a small, squat building, with heavily screened windows, and containing two rooms, barren of all furniture except a brass bed and bed clothing.

Stripped of practically all her clothing, the girl told officers, she spent most of her time in the bed in an effort to keep warm. Her meals consisted mostly of sandwiches brought from downtown by members of the gang. She was given much "dope" and moonshine whiskey, she said.

The girl declared she was captured by members of the gang in a downtown street, taken to the shack and kept a prisoner for six weeks, during which time she became a drug addict.

The girl escaped from her captors by jumping through a window of the squalid shack while her captors were all absent. She reported her terrible experience to juvenile court officials, who now have her in custody.
